

Budgeting Committee for Harbor Chest Agencies Told by Chairman

Scarlet Fever, 'Strep' Throat Making Rounds

Thus far in 1961, some 459 cases of streptococcal sore throat, commonly called "strep" throat — or scarlet fever when a rash appears — have been reported to local health officials in Los Angeles County. As in the case of so many of the contagious diseases, the illness that is caused by this disease is seldom severe unless treatment is neglected and complications develop. Fatality is low, but about one death occurs in every 300 to 400 cases reported.

Although this streptococcal infection may occur in persons of any age, children in the 5 to 9-year-old age group are the ones most frequently stricken. Signs of the infection, particularly if it is severe, include a high fever, sore throat, tonsillitis, swollen glands in the neck, nausea and vomiting. In the case of typical scarlet fever, a rash also appears.

THE SCARLET rash that occurs on certain parts of the body is the chief difference between the entity known as scarlet fever and other streptococcal throat infections. With the exception of Negroes, the rash does not appear on the face in a typical case of scarlet fever, although the cheeks are usually flushed. In any event, the rash is a visible sign that the bacteria are either potent producers of a rash-producing toxin or that the person has no immunity to the toxin.

The older a person is, the less likely it is that the scarlatinal rash will develop in the presence of a strep throat since the individual is generally immune to the toxin by the time maturity is reached. When a strep throat occurs after childhood it is, so to speak, scarlet fever without the rash.

TRANSMISSION of the disease occurs through contact with the nasal, throat or lesion discharges of the sick person, or through personal contact with objects freshly contaminated with such discharges. Patients recovering from the disease, and healthy persons as well for that matter, may be nasal carriers of the infective organisms for a time and so be a means of spreading the infection to others.

The importance of air-borne transmission of the streptococcal strains that cause strep throat is not clearly established, although they reach the air via contaminated dust, and the clothing and bedding of the sick person. Furthermore, it is possible that outbreaks of the disease may occur after ingestion of certain foods contaminated by these particular streptococci.

STREPTOCOCCAL sore throat can be prevented and cured with specific drugs. Persons under treatment usually become free of the organisms, and therefore noninfectious, soon after the course of treatment is started. There is no practical immunization against the disease.

A lack of medical care in these cases may lead to serious consequences. Complications that may occur in the face of neglect include rheumatic fever, rheumatic heart disease, silar abscess, kidney dis-
