

State Banking Centers Given High Standing

Security First National Bank's research department reported yesterday that the state of California has the third and fifth largest banking centers in the nation.

According to the report, the Los Angeles-Long Beach Metropolitan area is the leading center in the state. As of June 15, 1960, the area had bank deposits totaling \$9,130,527,000,

an increase of over 10 per cent from the mid-1958 deposit total of \$8,287,081,000.

The 1960 figure is exceeded only by the New York area, which ranks first with

\$51,829,321,000, and second place Chicago with \$12,597,781,600.

The San Francisco-Oakland area is in fifth position, the bank said, having been passed by the Philadelphia area between mid-1958 and mid-1960.

ONLY SEVEN states in the country have larger bank deposits than the Los Angeles

Metropolitan area, the report noted. They are: New York, California, Illinois, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Texas, and Massachusetts.

Of this group only the first four states exceed the total of \$12,130,215,900 in bank deposits reported for the southern half of California.

Ten Southern California

counties which have bank deposits in excess of \$100 million are: Los Angeles, \$8,589,952,500; San Diego, \$875,173,000; Orange, \$540,574,500; Fresno, \$407,897,000; San Bernardino, \$362,414,000; Kern, \$278,886,400; Riverside, \$266,889,700; Santa Barbara, \$227,329,900; Tulare, \$166,444,100; and Ventura, \$164,302,700.

WITH THE exception of Fresno county, the report said, all of the counties in the southern part of California recorded 1959-60 gains in bank deposits exceeding the state average of 8 per cent.

The largest increases were registered by Orange, plus 24 per cent; Inyo, plus 23 per cent; Riverside, plus 16 per

cent; Santa Barbara, plus 14 per cent; and San Diego, plus 14 per cent.

The official deposit totals, from which this report was prepared, were compiled by the board of governors, Federal Reserve System, and are only published every two years.
