

**Local Schools
Send Old Books
To Asian Pupils**

Obsolete Torrance textbooks have been given to the U.S. Navy for distribution in English-speaking schools in Asia, according to Dr. Albert Posner, assistant school superintendent.

Noting questions raised about state textbook disposal, Posner pointed out that during the past few years, some 16,000 obsolete textbooks had been given to the Navy for shipment to the Philippines, Korea, and Okinawa.

State law allows disposal of obsolete textbooks after they are worn by extensive use or after the state has adopted new texts in various fields. When new state texts are adopted, the law requires use of these new books in place of the old ones, he said.

Some of the old texts are kept for supplementary classroom use, he said, while more worn texts may be cut up for the pictures and charts in them. The rest of the books are given to the Navy because of the storage problem they would create otherwise, he reported.

**New Booklet
Has Answers
About Cancer**

The answers to 101 frequently asked questions about cancer are given in a newly published booklet now available without charge from the Los Angeles County Branch of the American Cancer Society, it was announced today by District Chairman, Mrs. Robert Stapleton.

The publication is a revised edition of a booklet which during the past ten years has been known as a "classic" of compact information about cancer.

IT INCLUDES nine categories of questions concerning the nature of cancer; what causes it; how cancer is detected and treated; cancer in men, women and children; vital statistics; and what the individual can do to protect himself against the disease.

As is customary in all American Cancer Society literature, the booklet also contains a list of signals.

In answer to the question "is cancer increasing?" the booklet states that the number of recorded cancer deaths each year has risen from 41,000 in 1900 to about 265,000 in 1959.

It says, "this bears a direct relationship to the increase in the total population and the increase of people over the age of 45—the age when the cancer death rate rises sharply.

THE BOOKLET points out that more lives can be saved from cancer if people take the following three steps:

1. Go to their family doctors for regular annual health checkups and whenever any of Cancer's Seven Danger Signals appear. This will make early diagnosis possible. Cancer is most curable in its early stages.

2. If cancer is present, have prompt, proper treatment and follow their physicians' advice.

3. Support research. Hundreds of scientists and research laboratories are searching for new and better ways of detecting, diagnosing and treating cancer bringing nearer the ultimate goal of discovering a cure or a way to prevent all cancer.
