The spirit of "Old World" recreation with "New World" enthusiasm is brought back through the fencing class sponsored by the Torrance Recreation Department.

Fencing is not a new sport, but in recent years has enjoyed renewed interest by those who want to be physically fit and mentally alert.

According to "Jeep" La Mont, instructor for the class, basic fencing involves 41 basic moves and usually takes a full year before an individual is ready for competition.

"FENCING involves the tenacity of a boxer; the grace of a dancer; and the thinking of a chess player," La Mont says. Fifty-five members are presently enrolled in the class, with ages ranging from 15 to 49 years. Competition is based on skill, not age and one may compete with someone his senior or junior. Beginners may join the class at any time and some of the members are potential members of the 1964 Olympic team.

An eighth inning home run by Carey Hubert provided the North High Saxons with two runs and a hard fought 5-3 win over host Culver City in prep baseball action today. The victory climaxed the Saxon practice schedule and left them with a 4-1 mark prior to the Bay League opener against Mira Costa on Tuesday.

Sophomore Hubert swatted his homer after Jim Carrio had doubled with two outs in the last inning. Hubert blasted losing pitcher Bob Mandell's offering over the scoreboard that loomed some 350 feet away against the darkening sky. Carrio and Hubert teamed up for a total of six of the Saxons' nine hits.

FOUR PITCHERS worked for North as Coach Bob Shoup wanted to observe his staff before the league begins. Hubert pitched the first four innings, giving up two hits, but no runs. Billy Kehoe threw two innings and gave up the three runs. Two runs came by way of some shaky defense. Jon Beck and Bill Shenkle mopped up, with Beck getting credit for the win. The quartet gave up three hits and struck out 11.

Pitching has been a bright spot for the Saxons so far, Shoup says. Senior Dennis Hogue leads the staff with an earned run average of 1.23 for 17 innings. He has fanned 23 during three games and has a 2-0 record. No team has scored more than three runs off North and the mound staff has a fine 1.60 ERA.

NORTH'S RECORD shows other wins over Aviation 3-0, San Marcos 4-1, and Centennial 10-3. Tuesday's win over Centennial was especially gratifying as the Apaches held a 12-4 win over Torrance High.
