





**Torrance, Six Other Cities Back Peninsula Site for New College**  
Seven cities and 10 other organizations in the South Bay area have voted to back the Palos Verdes Peninsula as a site for the South Bay State College, a new school approved by the California state legislature in 1960.  
Cities which have voiced their approval of the Peninsula as a college site are Torrance, Rolling Hills, Rolling Hills Estates, Hermosa Beach, Redondo Beach, Lawndale and Manhattan Beach. Action is under consideration by the councils of El Segundo and Hawthorne, while Palos Verdes Estates and Inglewood are taking the matter under study.  
Other groups and organizations which have backed the project include the San Pedro, Torrance and Palos Verdes Peninsula chambers of commerce; San Pedro Current Events forum, Kiwanis Club of Palos Verdes, San Pedro Realty Board, West Portuguese Bend Community association, Palos Verdes Peninsula Unified school district and Palos Verdes Peninsula Civitan Club.  
Howard Seelye, general chairman of the citizens' committee, said that Albert Martin and Associates, architectural and engineering firm, has agreed to prepare detailed maps and charts, plus site studies, for use in making a presentation of the Peninsula sites to state officials.  
Earlier Larry Smith and Co., nationwide research firm, had been hired by the committee to undertake a study of the Peninsula area.

**Paint Furniture**
