

## Women for Good Government Hear Son of Founder Speak

Frank Johnson, grandson of the late Mrs. Gilbert Van Camp, founder of Women for Good Government, was guest speaker at the special March evening meeting, attended by 125 members and guests at the San Pedro Assistance League.

General Robert Shoe led the pledge of allegiance and the invocation was given by Rev. H. Lester Peterson, Good Shepherd Lutheran Church. Mrs. John (Aunt Kate) Dodson gave the American Creed.

MRS. HOLLY Holmes, president, read "Mr. & Mrs. America," which incorporated the ideas used by Mrs. Van Camp in organizing Women for Good Government; to educate and arouse a renewed interest toward the appreciation of Americanism and our free enterprise system, unparalleled in

any other nation on earth. Mrs. Charles Shute introduced Mr. Johnson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank L. Johnson, San Pedro, who last month resigned a position in the naval intelligence department where he worked both as a naval officer and then as a civilian employee. He is now devoting all of his time writing a book: "The United States Policy for Survival."

JOHNSON pointed to "the acknowledgement of President Kennedy who said in his State of the Union message, that the communist tide is running against us. He declared that this tide must and will be reversed. So far, however, he has failed to show how this will be accomplished."

"There is no greater folly," said Johnson, "than to believe

that we can compromise our differences with communism. We are losing the struggle for control of the world for one basic reason. We have, so far, not resolved to win it. If we would reverse the tide of disaster, we must drop the idea that communism can be contained."

JOHNSON said, "the U.S. should exercise more control over our foreign aid and grant aid only to countries who are clearly our friends. 'If we are truly willing to play the role of a great power,' he continued, 'we can expose the Soviet bluff and prove to the world that the Soviet Union is not riding the inevitable wave of the future. When this time comes, when Russia is clearly losing, not winning as she is today, then there will be a chance of a

real agreement. 'WE MUST demand of our leaders that communism be smashed — not by preventive nuclear war but by steady relentless pressure on our adversary until she is forced, in our own interest, to abandon the drive to dominate the world,' he said. Johnson concluded, "this can only be done by the United States — supreme in its military power, vigorous in its leadership and confident that its course is right, no matter what the obstacles."

During his visit to the local campus, Dr. Adams will be presented in formal lectures, and will participate in departmental and interdepartmental seminars, confer with students to discuss career possibilities, hold informal dis-

cussions with faculty, members, and meet with administrators on the role of anthropological programs, de la Haya said.

HE WILL ALSO examine library facilities and offer advice on library acquisitions in the field of anthropology.

"It is the purpose of the visiting lecturer program to make it possible for students who might otherwise have little or no acquaintance with the field, to learn of purposes and accomplishments," de la Haya said.

"ANTHROPOLOGY is a relatively new profession and one that is undergoing rapid expansion," he said. "As improved communications draw the population of the world into greater contact, it be-

## Garden Checklist

1. Keep privet hedges full and attractive by frequent clipping. Cut them back severely (not in winter months) to control size. They'll fill out again in a few weeks.

3. Don't expect a new lawn to look perfect too soon. Most lawns take several months to fill in to look their best.
4. Carnations may be planted now. So may chrysanthemums. Both like sunny gardens.
5. Plant annuals for late spring and summer color. Bedding plants abound in nurseries this month.
