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for teachers grading the exams given by the College Entrance Examination Board. If an exam is worth an "A" to one teacher of a specific subject, it should be worth an "A" to all teachers of the same subject.)

8. DROP THE course in psychology now being offered seniors in the high school and replace it with a course which will increase reading speed. (The course is available now, but not mandatory.)

9. Circulate a questionnaire

to all recent high school graduates and ask them to estimate the value to them of such courses as Student Activities and Leadership.

10. Conduct a survey of recent graduates now attending four-year colleges and ask them how they feel their preparation compares with that of students from other districts or states.

11. Conduct a survey among recent graduates of high school who are now freshmen in four-year schools before the end of this school year to find out in which subjects, if any, the preparation could be improved and correct any shortcomings in the next school year.

(This should be done annually to keep the district on its toes.)

12. DEVELOP A more complete and extensive counseling service so that secondary school students can receive proper guidance for the future for which they are best fitted.

13. Extend vocational and business courses to equip graduates of high school with skills that can be sold to any employer.

cept their responsibility to encourage the desire to learn. (However, if Johnnie would do well as an auto mechanic or an office machine operator, don't insist upon his undertaking the college preparatory course.)

15. Conduct a survey among the teachers in the District to ascertain the factors that they consider desirable — wages, security, working conditions, fringe benefits, housing, environment, cultural surroundings, etc. (In this way the District can find out what means most to teachers and point its course accordingly, thus improving employee, community, and public relations in one move.)

Between now and June 30,

Ellis said, much of the planning for the next school year must be considered.

Ellis is one of three incumbents seeking election in Tuesday's balloting.
