Lucky Stores To Expand Chain in '61

Lucky Stores, Inc., plans a five million dollar store expansion program this year, according to Gerald A. Aves, president of Lucky.

Aves, addressing a meeting of the Los Angeles Society of Security Analysts at the University Club, said that Lucky expects to open about 20 new stores in the state, 11 of which will be located in the Southland.

A 3.5 million dollar warehouse expansion is scheduled for completion in 1962. Lucky has acquired 30 acres of land in Buena Park, and architects are working on plans for a 200,000 square foot warehouse and office facility to be erected on the new site.

Aves also told the analysts of Lucky's plans for expansion in the new discount house field. Last year Lucky acquired a majority interest in the Gemco store in Anaheim, and further expansions are projected.

"We are hopeful that we will be able to open two more Gemco stores this year, and two more next year," Aves said. "Lucky management realizes that discount house merchandising is important and we intend to participate in it fully."

Discussing sales and earnings for the coming year, Aves said that Lucky anticipates sales of more than \$200,000,000 in 1961. He indicated that earnings would be approximately \$1.25 to \$1.40 per common share, reflecting general economic conditions.
