


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

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### Programs for Smoothing Change To High Schools Told to TEAC

How the gap between Torrance Elementary and high schools is bridged was described Monday at the monthly Torrance Educational Advisory Committee at the Torrance

Masonic Lodge. Describing the activities which help students move from the eighth to the ninth grade smoothly were Dr. Bruce Magner, curriculum consultant, and Dr. Carl Ahee, Dale M. Harter, and John A. Lucas, principals of the three local high schools.

ALTHOUGH the "gap" between all grade levels must be bridged, Magner pointed out, the need becomes more acute at the eighth-ninth grade level, when students move from elementary to high school. It is, however, easier to do within a unified school district, he noted.

South High's Principal John Lucas pointed out that a number of meetings and gatherings are held in which elementary and high school students and teachers get a chance to learn about each other.

HIGH SCHOOL students visit elementary schools to explain the program; demonstrate science, athletics, or some other programs; or put on assemblies for the elementary youngsters, he said. Many other opportunities are offered for the students to learn about the high school program as well.

At the same time, elementary students get chances to visit the high schools for music festivals, use of the library, science exhibits, or for visitation of actual classes.

EIGHTH GRADE parents may visit high school open houses, high school classes, or other events and confer with high school counselors, Lucas said. Eighth and ninth grade teachers confer on problems of the individual student. In general, all of these methods help to make the transition easier, he said.

Eighth grade students are pre-registered while still in elementary school, Torrance Principal Ahee explained. This, he said, represented individual guidance at its best by his eighth grade teacher, who has worked closely with him and knows his needs best.

DURING THE entire registration period, a two-way communication process between parents and school is maintained, he said.

When the student arrives for his ninth grade classes, every effort is made to make him feel "at home." Ahee said. Freshman Orientation Day is held just before school begins to acquaint the student with the campus and the general information about the school.

DALE HARTER, North High principal, pointed out that summer school is one important means of making the transition smoother. It is, he said, no longer a place for the slow or inept student, but one where some of the best minds can get additional work. At the same time, he noted, it helps orient eighth graders to campus and "bridges the gap more gradually."

Torrance's summer school, slated from June 20 to July 29, will offer these advantages for eighth graders, he noted:

1. Students can improve their work in basic subjects.
2. Students can take exploratory courses in such areas as speech, typing, music, or other things which couldn't be taken otherwise.
3. Top students can take accelerated work in math and science.

### Chace To Run Unopposed in June Primaries
