### PTA Gives Curfew Law Reminder

Torrance Council of Parents and Teachers, realizing the concern of parents and citizens in the matter of child welfare, is sending, through local units, a letter to parents of children in grades six through twelve quoting local city ordinances regarding the Curfew.

Many new residents of the city of Torrance are not aware of these laws and many other residents not heretofore concerned may not be sure of their responsibilities.

Section 18.5 reads, Every person under the age of eighteen years who loiters about the public streets, avenues, alleys, parks or public places between the hours of 10 p.m. and the time of sunrise of the following day, when not accompanied by his parent or legal guardian, having legal custody and control of such person, or spouse of such person over twenty-one years of age, is guilty of a misdemeanor. (Ord. 382, Sec. 1.)

Section 18.6 reads, Every parent, guardian or other person having legal care, custody or control of any person under the age of eighteen years who allows or permits such person to violate any provision of the preceding Section is guilty of a misdemeanor. (Ord. 382, Sec. 2.)

### Chicken Paprika, Coleslaw Make a Tempting Twosome

Chicken, which according to the Consumer Marketing Information released by the University of California is one of the best meat buys in the Southern California Markets, is versatile in its preparation and our guest cook today gives us a tempting way to prepare fried chicken.

The John Brislin family at 1604 Greenwood Ave. are always pleased to find Oven Fried Chicken Paprika on their dinner table. Mrs. Brislin contributes this recipe as well as her favorite old fashioned coleslaw and a peppy Ginger Puff that makes a meal complete.

The Brislins moved to Torrance four years ago. They have two children, Patricia, an eighth grade student at Greenwood school and Mary Lynn in

the first grade at Nativity. Mrs. Brislin is a typical housewife, maintaining her home and finding time for bowling and bridge. She is active in Greenwood PTA and the Nativity Mothers Club.

Mr. Brislin is employed by Hughes Aircraft. He is a member of the Knights of Columbus.

The three favorite recipes of this typical Torrance homemaker are as follows:

#### Oven Fried Chicken Paprika

- |                           |                         |
|---------------------------|-------------------------|
| 1/4 c butter or margarine | 1 tsp paprika           |
| 1/4 c flour               | 1/2 tsp onion salt      |
| 1-2 lb. fryer (cut up)    | 2 tsp lemon juice       |
| 2 eggs                    | 1 c dried bread crumbs. |
| 1 1/2 tsp salt            |                         |

One hour before serving heat oven to 350 degrees. In 13 inches by 9 by 2 inch pan melt butter in oven. Meanwhile, put flour in paper bag, then chicken, shake until chicken is thoroughly coated. In bowl, beat eggs with salt, paprika, onion salt and lemon juice. Dip floured chicken in egg mixture, one piece at a time, then roll in crumbs, coat evenly. Place chicken in melted butter with skin down. Bake for 45 minutes or until fork tender, turning once. Serves 4.

#### Old Fashioned Coleslaw

- |                                  |                  |
|----------------------------------|------------------|
| 2 1/2 c cabbage (crisp shredded) | 2 or 3 tsp sugar |
| 1/2 c green onions (sliced)      | 3 tsp vinegar    |
| 1/2 c parsley (snipped)          | 2 tsp salad oil  |
|                                  | 1 tsp salt       |

Combine chilled vegetables. Mix remaining ingredients for dressing. Make sure sugar is dissolved. Pour over vegetables. Toss lightly. Makes 6 servings.

#### Ginger Puffs

|----------------|---------------------|
| 1 egg          | 1 tsp cinnamon      |
| 1/2 c molasses | 1 tsp baking powder |
| 1/2 c sugar    | 1/2 tsp salt        |
| 1 tsp ginger   | 1/2 c warm water    |
|                | 2 c flour           |

Beat egg until light, add sugar, molasses, butter and water. Add sifted flour with dry ingredients. Drop by teaspoon on greased cookie sheet. Batter will be thin. Bake 350 degrees for 5 to 6 minutes. 1/2 cup nuts or raisins may be added.
