

4800 Volunteers to Seek Cancer Funds on Monday

American Cancer Society volunteers will go door-to-door between 6 and 9 p.m. next Monday throughout District 8 which includes Torrance, the South Bay and Centinela Valley cities.

More than 4800 volunteers will be out, attempting to visit every home in the area, officials report.

"Our house-to-house Crusade occurs just one night a year," according to Mrs. Raphael Blaye, residential crusade chairman.

"IT'S OUR BIG give-and-take drive," she said. "ACS volunteers will give every family life-saving facts about cancer, and they will take away with them, we hope, the most generous possible contributions."

The April 25th house-to-house march will be the big point of anti-cancer activity. April is officially designated as Cancer Control month by Act of Congress and Presidential proclamation, Mrs. Blaye pointed out. Mayors within District 8 also have proclaimed April to be Cancer Control month.

Mrs. Blaye urged householders to turn on their porch lights to welcome the Cancer Crusaders. She stressed that educational literature would be left at every home regardless of whether the householder makes a contribution.

"A MAJOR PART of our program is educating people to have annual health checkups and to go to their doctors when a cancer danger signal appears. Cancer deaths could be cut in half — 85,000 Americans could be saved every year — if people only would go to their doctors in time," she said.

"Of course, there's the other side of the coin — the 132,500 who will continue to die of cancer each year unless science makes new discoveries. But research is constantly moving closer to the day when no cancer need be incurable."

"THAT'S WHY it's essential that we raise as much money as we possibly can," Mrs. Blaye said.

District 8's Crusade goal is \$126,000.

"When your Cancer Crusader comes on April 25th, greet her warmly," Mrs. Blaye urged. "Behind every eighth door there will be a potential cancer cure. The information brought may save a life that would otherwise be lost. The money collected will help cancer research move another step forward."


