## Clean-Up Drive Lauded by City School Leader

The Clean Up-Paint Up-Fix Up Campaign is an effective means of teaching youth the value and enjoyment of constructive action—i.e. juvenile decency, according to School Superintendent J. H. Hull.

"During a campaign the children and young people of this community are called upon to join forces with the adult population in an all-out effort to beautify and better Torrance, Dr. Hull explained. As they become an integral part of the campaign activities, and become familiar with government and citizen cooperative functions, their understanding

of the problems connected with running a community increases. At the same time, they will gain a respect for the ways these problems are tackled and solved," the Superintendent continued.

As youngsters become aware of the many constructive activities available in the community, I believe the philosophy of "there's nothing to do"—the cry that precedes and later excuses delinquent actions—will be reduced.

"When the children discover the thrill of cooperative effort and the pleasure of seeing their work materialize into

more attractive surroundings, a firm building block will be added to juvenile decency.

"However," Superintendent Hull added, "these positive benefits will be forthcoming only if the adults of the community lead the way in active participation. Help support juvenile decency by exhibiting adult responsibility in your

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## Wide Participation Hailed In Successful YMCA Drive

Nearly every service group in the city gave to the successful YMCA fund drive which just reached its \$32,000 goal, according to Board Chairman Scott F. Albright.

Largest gifts came from the Torrance Lions; Torrance Rotary; North Torrance Lions; Las Vecinas Club; Torrance Police Officers Assn., and scores of other civic groups.

Albright said that YMCA Board members were most impressed by two gifts: The first was \$1000 given personally by Homer Bale, a real estate developer in the area; and, the second most impressive gift was \$2.37 given by the members of a Brownie Troop which meets each week at the YMCA.

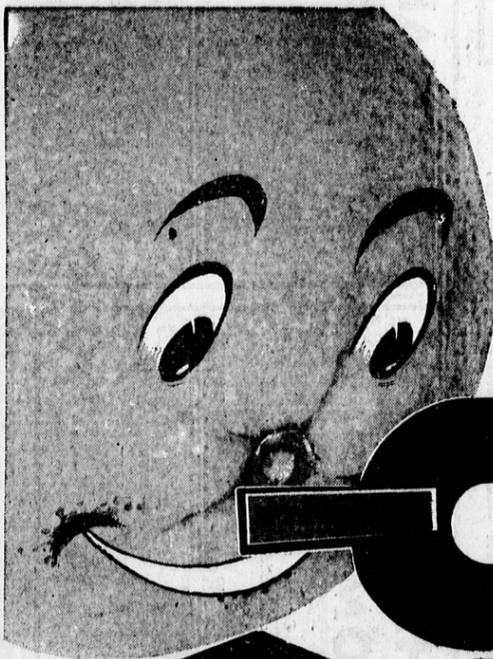
THE LOCAL YMCA will operate upon a budget of \$35,363 for the 12-month period starting last March 1. The added funds will be received from A-I-D allocations and from families and firms who have not yet been able to share in support for the city's largest and most active youth agency. The

cost of the campaign was less than 3 per cent of the goal.

While the Torrance YMCA will be honored at a huge banquet for all Southland Y's on June 7, the real trophy will be continued youth services for more than 6000 local boys and girls who look to the YMCA for clubs, camps, athletics, leadership training and personal counseling.

THE SUCCESS of the local YMCA current support campaign for the past two years has advanced the hope that a large building campaign for a new comprehensive Torrance YMCA building may soon be possible. A development committee has been meeting for over two years to design the most suitable facility with which to serve Torrance teenagers and youngsters in the years to come.

At the present time, the development committee foresees a \$360,000 plant being built over the next four years. Such a program would include club rooms, social hall, swimming pool, lockers and showers, game rooms, offices, and more than one acre for outdoor activities and day camping. George Heaton, of Rome Cable, heads this important group for the YMCA.



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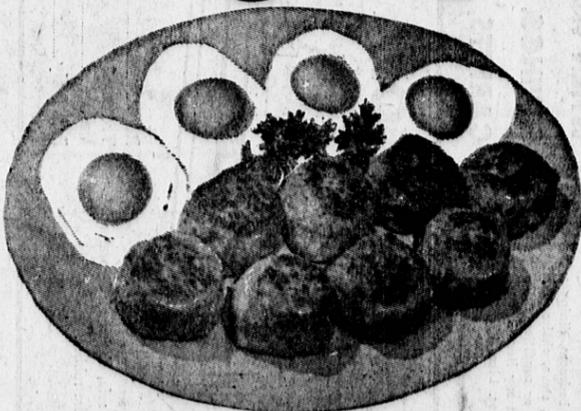


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
