


**Homework Rule Of Local School District Told**

A recent statement on homework issued by the American Medical Assn. agrees very closely with the Torrance Unified School District's policy on the same subject, according to Assistant Superintendent Albert Posner.

He noted that a recent statement authored by Dr. Willard Abraham noted that "it's time to set up a bill of rights to protect school children and their parents from the wrong kind of homework."

Torrance agrees with Dr. Abraham's nine criteria for home work, Dr. Posner said. They are:

1. Homework should be personalized and adopted to the individual needs of the student or groups of students.
2. It should be of the type that can be done better at home than at school.
3. It should be started in school so that the student is not completely dependent on parental guidance.
4. It should not be restricted to book study or writing assignments of a repetitive nature.
5. It should not interfere with wholesome home activities.
6. It should not have a strict time limit.
7. It should not be assigned for the sole purpose of keeping parents informed about what the school is doing.
8. It should be definite, but not so definite that initiative is destroyed.
9. It should be preceded by careful attention to appropriate study skills.

**300 Experts Speak to Area Pupils**

More than 300 community "experts" have been approved for speaking to Torrance school classes during the past two years, according to a report to the Board of Education. These speakers addressed both elementary and high school audiences.

Speakers on various foreign countries led the list. Other most popular topics included aviation, chemistry, missiles, electronics, grooming, health, homemaking, law enforcement, music and art, physics and salesmanship.

**Moose Lodge Establishes Scholarships**

Charles R. Britt Jr., chairman of the Torrance Moose lodge civic affairs committee, has announced the establishment of a science scholarship program by the fraternal organization, and that it will award a \$50 scholarship and medals to selected high school graduates in the Torrance area starting with this year's June graduating class.

"This program constitutes the lodge's first venture into a worthy talent recognition and education-aid activity," said Britt, "and next year we intend to increase the scholarship to \$100." President Eisenhower's suggestion that emphasis be placed on science in our school programs directed the lodge's choice of science proficiency as a pre-requisite for the Moose scholarship.

Medals will be awarded to the runners-up in the scholarship competition. A lodge judging committee will choose a winner from a list of students selected by the Torrance public schools and the Bishop Montgomery high school.

**PV Art Group To Open New Exhibit Sunday**

The 14th annual invitational Purchase Award Show sponsored by the Palos Verdes Community Art Assn. will open Sunday at the Palos Verdes Library Art Gallery, and will be open to the public during regular library hours until June 1.

For this exhibition the Association is offering a purchase prize of \$500. The painting is to be purchased by the Association for its permanent collection. Two \$50 honorable mention awards also will be made.

The awards will be made by the officers and directors of the association with the advice of three well qualified and well known art jurors: Dr. Lester Longman, director of the art department at the University of California at Los Angeles; Dr. Thomas Leavitt, director of the Pasadena Art Museum, and Dr. Hans Burkhardt, artist and instructor at the University of Southern California.

Twenty-eight artists have been invited to send one oil painting each to the exhibition.


