Welfare Group To Hold Annual Meeting May 4

Fred Gledhill of the Consolidated Western Steel Division, United States Steel Corp., will be the speaker at the May 4th annual meeting of the Harbor Area Welfare Planning Council.

Gledhill is vice chairman of the Southern California Research Council, an independent organization of Southern California business executives and college faculty economists who undertake research into specific problems of Southern California.

Gledhill is a native of Los Angeles, a graduate of Pepperdine College, and received his law degree from the University of Washington. He has been with Consolidated Western Steel for over five years as assistant manager of commercial research.

City Takes On Standard Oil In Street Tiff

With a one-two punch which will probably prove far from a knock-out combination, the city council this week took on the Standard Oil Co. in round one of a battle for the strips.

Delivering punch one, the council voted to go ahead with condemnation proceedings on land needed at Crenshaw and Lomita Blvds. for widening of the right of way to accommodate installation of traffic control signals.

Coming across with punch two a little later, the council voted to require the oil company to dedicate a strip 30 feet deep and 150 feet long on Madrona Ave. at Sepulveda Blvd. for the widening of Madrona.

An attorney speaking for the oil company indicated his firm would go along with the dedication of the land, but balked at being required to improve it also with curbs, gutters, and sidewalks.


The least the city could do, he indicated, would be to make the improvements if the landowner gave up the valuable property.

The council wasn't having any . . . "it's against policy." So the company will be required to give up the land and improve it too . . . or fight it out in court.

Resuscitation Film Showing Slated by YMCA

All fathers of the area are being invited to view a filmed demonstration of mouth-to-mouth resuscitation at the YMCA building at 6:45 p.m. tomorrow and again Wednesday.

The free showings are being offered as a service to fathers in preparation for the summer months ahead, according to Joe Wilcox, executive secretary of the sponsoring YMCA.

"A drowning victim will die in just four minutes without aid," added William Poser, chief of the 65 Torrance Y-Indian Guide Tribes.

"In thousands of tragedies each year, it takes longer than four minutes to find someone with the necessary knowledge to avert death," he said.

The showings will be at the Torrance YMCA headquarters at 2080 Washington Ave., near Plaza Del Amo and Arlington Ave.
