

Harbor Freeway Extension To Be Opened This Morning

Starting this morning the world's busiest roadway will be even busier as ribbon cutting ceremonies will be held to open northbound lanes of the Harbor freeway to traffic between Alondra Blvd. (161st St.) and 124th St., according to Supervisor Kenneth Hahn.

Joining the ceremonies will be official representatives of State, County, Los Angeles City, and area governments as well as southwest and South Bay civic leaders.

THE OFFICIAL ceremonies are scheduled for 9 a.m., after which the barricades will be moved to open the roadway for general traffic about 11 a'clock.

Don Davidson, past president, Gardena Valley Chamber of Commerce, will serve as master of ceremonies.

Pledge of allegiance will be led by Mayor Robert Kane of Gardena, after which the invocation will be asked by the Rev. H. M. Slusher, minister, Christ Community Evangelical United Brethren Church.

THOSE INVITED to extend welcoming remarks include State Senator Richard Richards, Assemblyman Clayton Dills, Assemblyman Vincent

Thomas, State Highway Commissioner Robert McClure, Los Angeles City Council President John S. Gibson Jr., Mayor Kane and Supervisor Hahn.

Recognition will be extended to a number of groups which pushed for construction of the freeway including the Gardena City Council, the Gardena Valley Chamber of Commerce, Dr. George Glassoff, president; the Harbor District Chambers of Commerce, Carl Hoffman, president; the Southside Chamber of Commerce, Eugene Rossi, president, and the Inter-cities Highway Committee, William Camron, president.

THESE GROUPS were all represented in a delegation which accompanied Supervisor Hahn to Sacramento in August, 1957 to urge the State Highway Commission to allocate funds needed to extend the freeway from 124th St. to 190th St.

The trip was initiated by Supervisor Hahn after he learned that plans were completed, the right of way secured, but money needed for construction had not been budgeted.

AS A RESULT of the strong, united presentation made before the Commission, funds were included in the budget and the contract was awarded in September, 1958 when the funds became available.

"Since that time, the Harbor Freeway has become the most heavily traveled roadway in the world and the vision and determination of all those who fought to get the freeway extended to 190th St. has been more than justified," Supervisor Hahn declared.

Ceremonies opening the three miles of northbound lanes will be conducted on the freeway at Alondra Blvd. and will be followed by a motorcade to the present terminus of the freeway at 124th St. before the freeway is opened to general traffic.

Supervisor Hahn said that State Highway officials had informed him that southbound lanes will be opened to limited traffic about three weeks later. Following removal of the temporary off-ramp at 124th St., southbound lanes will carry full traffic loads.

'Nothing But the Best' in Magic Chef, Builders Say

In Magic Chef's restaurant, the atmosphere is rich and serene, with pecky cypress woodwork, polished brass fittings, better-than-leather plastic upholstery (the same kind used on the most expensive furniture) in a clear cerulean blue.

A PIERCED plastic grillwork so new it has never before been used for screening in public or private buildings, will shield diners from the bustling market proper, so that they can enjoy delicious food in peace and relaxation.

And so it goes, throughout the market: the gleaming terrazzo floors, marble cutting slabs imported from Italy in the meat department; fine birch plywood covering walls in storage areas—which customers never see!—where the usual market uses unfinished lumber.

"Everything that went into Magic Chef," says the market's planners, "had to pass two tests: for beauty and for utility. It costs a lot, sure—but we think quality pays for itself. The customers are the ones who will prove it."



