AiResearch Tells of New Liquid Gas Transmission

A phenomenon in the efficient transmission of liquefied gases used for cryogenic cooling has been reported by The Garrett Corp.'s AiResearch Manufacturing Co. of Los Angeles.

The discovery was announced Monday during the annual Aviation Writers Association meeting now being held in Los Angeles in the Ambassador Hotel.

USING UNIQUE, un-insulated lines, AiResearch has transmitted liquid nitrogen at minus 320 degrees F over distances greater than 25 feet. Previously, six feet was the maximum.

Though the transfer lines used have no insulation or lagging, their exterior remains frost free and may be safely and comfortably manipulated with bare hands even though the liquid inside is a minus 320 degrees F.

THE NEW technique, with patent pending, enables liquid nitrogen to be stored at a considerable distance from cooling areas without recourse to the cumbersome and expensive vacuum insulated lines previously required.

In missile applications, where refrigeration requirements are often concentrated in already

crowded areas, the new transmission lines enable the supply vessel to be stored in another area.

A FURTHER advantage derived from the new transmission method is the ability to use flexible plastic lines which greatly simplify the delivery of cryogenic refrigerants to moving elements, such as gimbal or swivel mounted scanning devices.

Using the new technique, AiResearch has started production on a liquid nitrogen refrigeration system for an infrared detector. This system, which consists of a storage vessel, transfer line and controls, maintains the infrared detector at a constant minus 320 degrees F even though the liquid supply is located 25 feet from the detector head.

INFRARED equipment functions more efficiently when cooled to cryogenic temperatures because of the reduction of thermal energy. This, in turn, reduces noise and provides a more favorable noise-to-signal ratio and more sensitive detection.

AiResearch currently manufactures infrared cooling systems for various high performance aircraft and missiles.

The girls are looking forward to Day Camp this summer. Mothers of some of the girls are taking training so they can assist.

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
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
