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John Wayne in "LEGEND OF THE LOST"
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Salvation Army Celebrating 80th Year of Service to U.S.

This week marks the 80th anniversary of the establishment of The Salvation Army in the United States and all Salvationist operations are observing the period as "Salvation Army Week."

The Salvation Army "invaded" the United States with a "force" of one man and seven girl officers in 1880, landing on the New York Battery and "taking possession" of the country in a dedicatory service in which Commissioner George Raiton, leader of the contingent, and the girl lieutenants knelt in prayer publicly as the Army's first official act in the United States.

During the past 80 years, many of which were spent serving under great difficulties and much persecution, the Salvation Army now serves in thousands of cities and towns, with 5000 officers and almost 10,000 centers of work.

IN SOUTHERN California, The Salvation Army has established community services in Los Angeles, Anaheim, Burbank, Compton, Chula Vista, Glendale, Huntington Park, Inglewood, Lancaster, Long Beach, Ontario, Oxnard, Pasadena, Pomona, Redlands, Riverside, Redondo Beach, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Pedro, Santa Ana, Santa Barbara, Santa Maria, Santa Monica, Ventura, Whittier, and in approximately 150 smaller communities where service extension units are maintained through the assistance of volunteer workers and service extension committees.

In many southern California communities, more than one branch of Salvation Army service operates.

IN LOS ANGELES and in San Diego, branches of the Booth Memorial Hospital chain operate at 2670 N. Griffin Ave. in Los Angeles, and at 2301 Bolinas St. in San Diego. These hospitals serve unmarried girls approaching motherhood, offering complete casework serv-

ice, prenatal care, postnatal services, with a caseload of approximately 135 girls, many of them in their early teens. These hospitals operate fully accredited junior high school and high school programs for the girls during their spare time at the hospital prior to their delivery.

Many of the girls spend as long as three months living at the hospital. The hospitals also offer outpatient services and plans for girls who are unable to gain admittance to the hospitals prior to the time for their delivery.

THE MEN'S Socia' services of The Salvation Army in southern California are carried on in Los Angeles, Van Nuys, Long Beach, Pasadena, Santa Monica, San Diego, San Bernardino, and Santa Barbara, with a capacity for 750 resident care beneficiaries.

These institutions operate self-sustaining programs of rehabilitation of handicapped men through the collecting of salvagable discard household articles of furniture, clothing and other no-longer-wanted materials which are repaired and sold through the Army's distribution outlets to provide funds for the operation of the program which last year produced more than \$2,000,000 in welfare services without one cent of cost to the public in cash.

OTHER SERVICES conducted in various sections of southern California include youth services through red shield youth centers, services to members of the armed forces, services on behalf of men and women in correctional institutions and fully standardized welfare services for families and transients in all principal centers of work, including "hospitality houses" for the overnight care of transient men, women and children. Hahn Requests State Funds For County-Held Juveniles

Supervisor Kenneth Hahn leveled his sights at a problem which is costing Los Angeles County taxpayers about \$1,000,000 a year for caring for juveniles who are wards of the State Youth Authority and for which Los Angeles County receives no reimbursement from the State.

On his motion, the Board of Supervisors instructed County Counsel Harold W. Kennedy, Probation Officer Karl Holton, and Chief Administrative Officer L. S. Hollinger to initiate what ever action is necessary to secure reimbursement from the State for care of the juveniles.

uation in checking through the preliminary County budget—which he says can be reduced substantially—and learned that the County is caring for an average of 200 juveniles a month who are awaiting placement in Youth Authority schools and detention facilities.

"Technically, these juveniles are not the legal responsibility of Los Angeles County. They are being held at Juvenile Hall and at Los Padrinos because the Youth Authority does not have facilities for them. From the time they are placed in Juvenile Hall, it takes from 40 to 75 days for them to be placed in State institutions. During this time the County feeds, clothes, houses and cares for them—without receiving any reimbursement from the State," Hahn explained.
