Ration Days Recipes Are Shared by Mrs. Marshall

A bride in wartime when foods were rationed, tested her ingenuity and has brought the title of "good cook" to Mrs. W. B. Marshall, 3707 W. 225th St. Making a tasty meal out of nothing was a good way to learn to cook, and today's guest cook has contributed three of her favorite recipes, originating in those days when food was hard to get.

The Marshalls have lived in Torrance for the past seven years. They have two children, Jennie, 14, who enters South High next fall and Charles, 11, student at Meadow Park school.

Mrs. Marshall has been active in the PTA and was presented with an Honorary Life Membership this year. She has also worked with the Girl Scouts and the entire family is active at St. Mark's Presbyterian Church in Lomita.

Mrs. Marshall has taught Sunday school and at present she and her husband are advisors for the Senior High Fellowship. Today's guest cook also belongs to the Good Neighbor club.

Both of the Marshalls are graduates of Inglewood High school. Mr. Marshall is in business with his brother and father and they own the Keystone Bolt and Supply Co. in Los Angeles.

For today's recipe column, Mrs. Marshall has selected a Pineapple Salad which she says goes especially well with a barbecue dinner or a luau. Another favorite is her Apple Cake Pudding, which is always requested when the Good Neighbor club has a pot luck or progressive dinner. The third recipe is a concoction of several dishes (another test of our cook's ingenuity) when she was asked to plan a St. Patrick's Day dinner for the couples' club at the church, with emphasis on economy.

PINEAPPLE SALAD

1 lg. can pineapple chunks (chilled)	1 small bag coconut (shredded)
1/2 to 1/3 bag marshmallows (small)	1 lg. carton sour cream

Toss all ingredients together just before serving. Serves 6.

APPLE CAKE PUDDING

1 c raisins (optional)	1 egg
1/2 c chopped nuts	1 tsp. soda
2 c apples	1/2 c orange juice
1/2 c flour	1/2 c melted butter
1 c sugar	1 tsp vanilla
1/4 tsp. salt	1 tsp cinnamon

Combine raisins, nuts, and apples in a large bowl. Sift flour with sugar, cinnamon, salt into bowl containing fruit. Blend well. Beat egg slightly, add soda to orange juice and add to egg along with melted butter and vanilla. Combine with fruit and flower mixture. Pour into a greased 8x12 baking dish. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes. Cut into squares and serve with a topping of almond flavored whipped cream.

HAM ROLL-UPS

8 to 10 cabbage leaves	1 can mushroom soup
4 c ground ham (or ground beef)	1 can water
	1 can tomato soup

Drop cabbage leaves into salted boiling water for three minutes. Then remove and cool. Stuff leaves with ham, roll up and secure with toothpicks. Place in a shallow baking dish and cover with soup mixture. Cover with foil and bake in a 325 degree oven for 1 hour. Uncover and cook another 15 minutes. Serves 4 to 5. You'll find the ham will have a cornbeef taste, thus you will have a good old fashioned "Dinty Moore" type dinner", says Mrs. Marshall.
