### Chest Agencies Provide Summer Activity for Area Youngsters

Thousands of Harbor Area youth are taking advantage of a varied schedule of activities offered this summer by Community Chest-sponsored youth services.

Those agencies serving area-wide are Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Camp Fire Girls and YWCA, and Mahar House in Wilmington and Homer Toberman Settlement House and Roosevelt Memorial Boy's Club, both in San Pedro.

**TO THOUSANDS** of boys, the Boy Scouts offer constructive experiences in outdoor living. Many troops of the Harbor District, Los Angeles Area Council, Boy Scouts, will attend a long term summer camp at Lake Arrowhead Scout Camp and other facilities. Day camps at Firestone Reservation in Brea will attract Cub Packs throughout the summer.

The big Scouting event in the Harbor District will be a Camporee to be held at Alondra Park, July 22 and 23. This Camporee will demonstrate various activities of Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts and Explorers.

**GIRL SCOUT** troops, too, in all Harbor cities have planned several out-of-doors activities, specifically day camps. Many have already been held and other day camps will take place as follows:

Lomita-Harbor City, Brownies Day Camp, Peck's Park, San Pedro, July 5-8 and a Girl Scout Primitive Camp, 24111 Walnut St., Lomita, July 5-7.

**SOUTH TORRANCE**, Torrance Park, July 25-29. South Gardena, Alondra Park, Aug. 16-19 and 23-26.

Three established camps of the Los Angeles Council Girl Scouts — Camp Catalina, Camp Manzanita and Camp Osito-Rancho — will draw hundreds of Girl Scouts for scheduled camping periods.

**THE CAMP FIRE** girls, which will celebrate its Golden Jubilee this year as an agency serving girls, have day camps set for Torrance Park, July 6-7, 13-14 and 20-21. In addition, many Camp Fire Girls will attend Camp Yallani in the San Bernardino mountains.

Another area-wide youth serving agency, the Harbor Area YWCA, has prepared a special program to appeal to junior high school girls that will feature crafts, dancing,

swimming and other events. The Wilmington branch started its sessions June 20, while San Pedro and Torrance branches will begin their programs on July 6.

**IN ADDITION**, many YWCA members will attend Camp Tahquita Meadows near Hemet this summer.

At the Mahar House, 1123 Mahar Ave., Wilmington, members can look forward to a full schedule of summer outings at the zoo, museum, Marineland and other places. Boys and girls clubs will meet regularly one day a week throughout the summer, with the weekly outings set for Wednesdays.

Meanwhile, the Homer Toberman Settlement House, 131 N. Grand Ave., San Pedro is now the scene of day camps that will run through July 21. Boys and girls 7-9 are scheduled for Mondays and Wednesdays, while the 10-12 age group is set for Tuesdays and Thursdays. Toberman groups will also attend out-of-city camps operated by other youth-serving agencies.

**THE BOYS' Club** of San Pedro, 780 W. 13th St., will feature "mite" baseball this summer for its younger members, in addition to its regular program of crafts (mornings only) and athletics. The Club will be open from 9 to 4 and again from 6:30 to 9. Some special events will be planned, including touch football to begin later this summer.
