1. In July, watering is of paramount importance in the garden. The C.A.N. says that to be effective water must penetrate to the depth of the roots of your particular plant. The interval between applications of water should be spaced to permit soil to become somewhat dry.
2. Before taking that vacation, irrigate and fertilize the lawns, bedding plants, trees and shrubs.

Assessment Hearings Will Start Friday

County Supervisors today accepted the preliminary assessment roll from County Assessor John Quinn and adopted rules for the Board of Equalization hearings which will commence tomorrow morning.

According to Supervisor Burton W. Chace, property owners who wish to protest their assessments must file their applications between the first and third Mondays of July. The Board of Supervisors sits as a Board of Equalization from July 5th until all applications are heard, sometime late in August. Last year the Board heard more than 1000 cases. "It is the right of every property owner to file a protest and be heard," Chace said. "If an owner can prove that his property has been unjustly assessed as compared to similar property he is entitled to ask that his assessment be reduced," Chace declared. Last year the value of all property in the county was \$10,899,881,050. It is anticipated that the increase in assessed value this year will be about 7.5 per cent.

Wage Increase Due Rome Cable Workers Soon

Over ten thousand dollars in additional wages was added to 88 employees of the Rome Cable Company, Division of Aluminum Corporation of America, 1739 213th St., Torrance.

The added money came from a job evaluation program negotiated by the company with the United States Steelworkers of America during national aluminum talks in Chicago last year.

Jobs in the Torrance operation were studied and placed in higher pay brackets resulting in the increases. Highest supplementary pay check for one employee amounts to \$374.90 in addition to the regular wage. It represents the increase in the hourly rate made according to the program retroactive to October 1959, when the former contract at the local plant expired.

According to the new agreement, the Rome Cable employees will also receive a wage increase of 13.3 cents an hour on August 1, 1960, plus an additional 2 cents an hour for the increased cost of living. Similar automatic increase will come due on August next year, according to the union-company labor agreement.

The Rome Cable employees are members of Local Union 5493, United Steelworkers of America, AFL-CIO.

178 St. Extension Would Bisect Park

A proposed extension of the 178th St. which would bisect Guensers Park was the subject of discussion at the June meeting of the Torrance Park and Recreation Commission. The extension, if completed, would leave three acre parks on each side of the street instead of the present recreation area. A committee was appointed to study the problem with the City Planning Commission.

In other action the Commission moved that surfboard regulations at Torrance Beach be posted and enforced more strictly. The commissioners also approved the request of Girl Scout Troop 218 of Red Lion, Pa., for use of El Nido Park as a camp site on their tour of the western states next summer.
