Should I sit there like a bump on a log, or would it be better to teach her a lesson and leave?—IGNORED GUEST



Miss Carr with 456 other girls spent the week of June 20-27 at the 17th Annual Girls State.

This program is designed to give the girls a working knowledge of city, county and state governments and a deeper value of the flag and the democratic system of government.
