Former Algerian, Austrian, German and Cuban Girl Scouts will teach their national songs and dances to 240 Torrance girls attending Girl Scout Day Camp, July 25 to 29, in Torrance Park.

Mrs. William Weber, 23002 Kathryn Ave., has been appointed Day Camp Director. She will be aided by an adult unit leader for every eight girls. Although Los Angeles Council Girl Scout Day Camps are run completely by volunteers, all leaders have received training for their jobs and are often veterans in Scouting service.

Leader of Intermediate Scout Troop 1374, Mrs. Weber has been given directors training, advanced first aid, camper's training and attended arts and crafts workshops. She has a daughter, Nancy Ann, 12, in her troop.

Emphasis of the summer day camp is on outdoor activities, but these will vary from unit to unit. Girl Scout philosophy encourages members to develop their own interests, thinking, and initiative, and for this purpose they are allowed to plan their own activities.

To carry out the theme of International friendship, songs, dances and foods from other lands will be utilized. Among the special resource people available will be a photographer who will help girls interested in that skill. Camp sessions will run from 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., with a general assembly on the last day for girls to demonstrate dances and sing the songs they learned.

"A harmonious and happy day camp experience," said Mrs. Weber, "is my goal for all who attend."

PROTEIN FOODS

Poultry production stays at a high level. Plan on using chicken and turkey for comparatively low-cost meals.

Lamb, another popular meat for western meals, is a bit more abundant right now than we had expected it to be. You'll see "specials" on both poultry and lamb.

Beef, always popular, is next in line, while pork is likely to be a little higher owing to a decrease in supplies and an increase in demand for certain cuts.

Scallops (frozen) are in heavier-than-usual supply. Scallops are a shellfish... similar to oysters or clams. Scallops develop an excellently flavored muscle. The meat is lean, light, firm, sweet flavored, with very little fat.

Try SCALLOP KABOBS:

- 1 pound frozen scallops
- 4 slices bacon, cut into squares
- 1 can (4 oz.) button mushrooms, drained or equivalent in fresh mushrooms
- 1 Bell pepper, cut into 1-inch squares
- 3 tablespoons butter or margarine, melted
- ½ teaspoon salt
- Pepper

Thaw scallops. Remove any shell particles and wash. Alternate scallops, bacon squares, mushrooms, and pepper on 6 skewers about 7 inches long. To broil in range, place the kabobs on greased broiler pan, and brush with seasoned butter. Broil about 3 inches from source of heat for 5 minutes. Turn carefully. Brush other side with butter and broil 3 to 5 minutes longer. Or the kabobs may be carefully broiled over charcoal.
