Brisk Building Pace Continues

New construction in Torrance during the first half of 1960 had a valuation exceeding \$20 million, a check by the HERALD revealed here yesterday.

With permits totaling more than \$1.5 million issued during June, the 1960 totals approached \$21 million, well up on Southern California building lists.

Figures of the city's building department also show that July won't be a slow month, with several permits exceeding \$100,000 already issued and others pending.

AMONG JULY permits is one for \$105,000 issued to Slim Kidwell to erect aircraft hangar facilities at Torrance Municipal Airport.

Others include a permit for a new teacher's residence for the Roman Catholic Diocese at 5430 Torrance Blvd. to cost \$79,950; permits for the new Elks Lodge building at 1820 Abalone to cost \$91,500; a four-store complex at 3132 W. 182nd St. for \$70,000; and a plastic manufacturing building costing \$106,000 and a processing building to cost \$35,000 for Belasco Investment Co. at 555 Alaska St.

Police rescued a 14-year-old Van Nuys girl Thursday evening when her screams were heard by residents in the 4200 block of Paseo De Las Tortugas. Officers found the girl partially disrobed and struggling with a 20-year-old Van Nuys brick mason as he attempted to criminally assault the girl.

Judge Names Doctors for Sanity Tests

Trial of a Torrance chemical worker on charges of murdering his wife here in April has been delayed until Aug. 4 to permit court-appointed doctors to determine the sanity of the suspect. Marvin J. Tyler, 26, who is accused of murdering his wife at their home at 23304 Falena Ave., may face a second charge of murder resulting in the death of the couple's second child, unborn at the time of the shooting.

The case is being heard in the Inglewood court of Superior Judge Thomas Yager.

A motion to dismiss the second charge has been entered by Tyler's attorney, Mrs. Taylor was dead on arrival at Harbor General Hospital and the infant, removed by Caesarean operation, lived for nearly 24 hours.

At the preliminary hearing here earlier, Municipal Judge Donald Donald Armstrong had dismissed the second murder charge, saying there was no evidence showing the child could be considered a live human when the shooting occurred.

Deputy District Attorney T. B. McNary of the South Bay Municipal Court District refiled the second charge in Superior Court, possibly opening the way for a precedent-setting decision.

Driver of Death Car Sentenced

The driver of an auto which struck and killed a 6-year-old Hawthorne lad here May 22 has been found guilty of reckless driving, fined \$263 and placed on three years summary probation.

Theodore McGill, 69, of 18322 Kingsdale Ave., received the reckless driving conviction and sentence from Municipal Judge Donald Armstrong after he was freed of charges of misdemeanor manslaughter, drunk driving, and operating without a driver's license.

McGill was arrested by Torrance police after his auto struck and killed Ralph E. Lane, 6, of 5103 W. 137th St., who was visiting relatives at 18310 Burin Ave. The Lane boy had just left an ice-cream truck and was crossing the street when the accident occurred.


Harbor General Hospital Groundbreaking Monday

A brief groundbreaking ceremony marking the beginning of construction for Los Angeles County's new 11½-million-dollar Harbor General Hospital Acute Unit and Outpatient Building has been scheduled for Monday at 3:30 p.m. at 1124 W. Carson St.

Present at the informal press event will be County Supervisors Burton W. Chace and Kenneth Hahn, Superintendent of Charities William A. Barr, and Alfred Thomas, director of Harbor General Hospital.

THE ACUTE unit will be an eight-story, 600-bed hospital, equipped for all medical and auxiliary purposes. The two-story outpatient building is planned to handle 9000 patients per month. Specified construction time is two years.

Also present at the groundbreaking will be Lou Griffiths of the Harbor District Chambers of Commerce; John A. Lambie, county engineer, C. R. Schoeppe, chief of the capital projects division, Architects Paul Williams, Welton Becket, Adrian Wilson, Frances Heusel; Lamar Wilson of Robert E. McKee Contractors, and other county officials.

Booked at Torrance jail on suspicion of robbery and narcotics possession were William Kyler Franey, 23, of 3331 W. Compton Blvd., and Trevor Lee Cox, 23, of 5618 Newton St.

ARRESTING officers said the pair was spotted in an old model sedan on Western Ave. Friday evening, and stopped because the auto license plate had no registration tab for 1960.

While checking the car, officers noted a partial case of expensive Scotch whiskey in the back seat which one of the men said was a gift of his father who lived in Inglewood. A check with Inglewood police showed the address given was a cemetery.

WHILE FRISKING the suspects for weapons, officers found what they suspected to be marijuana, and one of the suspects said, "You might as well get all of it."

He indicated two newspapers rolled and tied and laying in the car. Officers indicated these also contained marijuana.

The suspected narcotics was turned over to Sheriff's narcotics officers early yesterday for identification.

Rites Set For Early Businessman

Funeral services for Edward A. Schwartz, 77, pioneer Torrance businessman and resident, will be held at the First Lutheran Church, Flower and Carson St., Tuesday afternoon at 2 with Pastor William Rieder officiating. He died Friday evening.

Mr. Schwartz came to Torrance in 1920 and began operating Schwartz Men's Store at 1505 Cabrillo Ave. five years later. The store is still operated at the same location by his sons.

MR. SCHWARTZ was born near Vienna, Austria, and came to the United States with his parents as a boy. He was raised in South Dakota, living there until he came to Torrance.

He was instrumental with several others in forming the congregation of the First Lutheran Church here, and was a member until his death. He resided at 1731 Martina Ave.

SURVIVING Mr. Schwartz are his widow, Cora M.; two sons, Robert and John, both active in operation of the business operated for many years by their father; two granddaughters, Lisa and Susan Schwartz; a brother, Joseph Schwartz, Santa Ana; four sisters, Mrs. Freida Traynor, Pipestone, Minn., Mrs. Emma Berthofer of Vista, Mrs. Augusta Von Hagen and Mrs. Paula Dickson, both of Los Angeles. Burial will be in Green Hills Memorial Park.
