

Dodger Rookies Tame Red Devils, 8-1

Locals to Bank on Morris for Saturday Crucial with Culver

It'll be all or nothing for the Torrance Red Devils Saturday afternoon when they invest their Connie Mack League bankroll in the right arm of Billy Morris in an important "rubber game" match with league-leading Culver City.

The locals need a victory plus a subsequent season-ending Culver City loss to Westchester the following day in order to take the championship and a trip to San Diego for the District playoffs.

Morris, who pitched the first three innings in an 8-1 loss to the Dodger Rookies on Monday night at Wrigley Field, has a 4-0 Connie Mack League won-lost record. Torrance and Culver City are 1-1 for the season. The Red Devils took the last one, 5-3.

Morris was tapped for five hits in the three rounds he worked against the Dodger Rookies, yielding two runs, one earned.

The Dodger Rookies cracked 10 hits in all off Morris and his successors, Dennis Hogue and Ken Ellsworth, both of whom will be available for bullpen duty Saturday at 3 p.m. at Culver City High.

Torrance — which whipped San Pedro handily, 11-0 last Saturday — managed only two hits off two Dodger Rookie pitchers. Joey Moeller, the high priced bonus baby from Mira Costa High in Manhattan Beach, fired the final two rounds for the Rookies and struck out 5, but gave up the single Red Devil tally.

MIXED EMOTIONS

When Johnny Temple was traded by Cincinnati to Cleveland of the American League, two Dodger pitchers mourned. Don Drysdale and Sandy Koufax held him to 148 and 194 respectively, during his Reds' career. But Danny McDevitt, against whom he batted 378, was happy to see him leave.

Erv Palica, who pinch hit for Steve Ramirez in the 9th and walked, scored the run. He advanced from first to third on Billy Williams' single and scored on a wild pitch.



... By Any Other Name

Many of those who have swelled attendance at Thoroughbred race tracks to 33,000,000 may find the terminology of the sport strange if not confusing. For example, the "solid-hooved herbivorous mammal, equus caballus," is popularly . . . but not always called a horse. In Thoroughbred racing and breeding parlance, however, a horse is a male animal 5 years old or over. Prior to becoming officially a horse he is known by a number of other terms (not including some colorful, if unflattering, appellations given him by racing fans when he finishes "at the eighth pole")

Foal is a young horse of either sex and while unweaned is known as a suckling. When separated from the dam, or maternal parent, he or she is known as a weanling until January 1, when he, or she, becomes a yearling. If male, he becomes a colt and remains so, unless he becomes a gelding (sexless) until he is 5 years old; a female is a filly until 5. From 5 on they are horses or mares and when they become parents they are sires or dams. Collectively, horses by the same sire are his get; foals from the same dam, her produce. All are maidens until they win a race.

Nationals Advance in Ruth Tourney

John Weaver's Torrance National Babe Ruth League all-stars came out smelling like roses after two week end wins in the sudden death tourney at Del Amo Park and have advanced to Downey for a third playoff game, scheduled for Saturday.

The Nationals kayoed the cross-town Pacific-American all-stars 9-2 on Saturday behind John Cambon's five-hitter then nipped Compton in the Sabbath follow-up, 7-6 as Mike Hartley survived a five-run first inning to go all the way.

COMPTON HELD a 6-1 advantage as late as the 5th inning, but two runs in that frame and four in the 6th — the big blow being Steve Water's homer — kept the locals alive and kicking in the play offs.

Waters' two-out blow scored two runners ahead of him and gave the Nationals a commanding one-run lead for the first time in the game.

Steve Donahue tripled and Gerry Colen had two doubles for the winners to brace a seven-hit attack.

THE NATIONALS' American League rivals — defending Southern California champs — were eliminated from the playoffs Sunday by Westchester, 8-3, at Del Amo Park.

Westchester came up with four runs in the 7th to insure the win.

350 Vehicles Set For Gas-Drag Duel at Lions

The toughest battle of hot gas-dragsters thus far is pre-arranged Saturday, and a unique contest will also be featured, in the 1960 Midsummer Championship meet at Lions Associated Drag Strip, Long Beach.

DIRECTOR Mickey Thompson said that well over 350 vehicles, including 20 of the power-loaded railsters, will go in the afternoon-evening action.

The gas-dragsters now have a new common challenge: "Beat the Albertson Olds!" The super-charged racer has now been driven by 27-year-old Leonard Harris of Playa del Rey, to 11 consecutive wins at the 223rd St. strip — seven of them in a row for King of the Drag honors.

STRANGELY, several railbirds in the array against Harris, have either beaten his best elapsed time (8.96 seconds) or top speed (168.86 m.p.h.) for the 1320-foot sprint. But none have out-duelled the one-time gymnastic champ when the elimination chips were down.

Best records of his more outstanding rivals, show: Lefty Mudersbach, Pico-Rivera, dual Chevy dragster — 9.16 ET, 169.49 m.p.h.; Dode Martin, with the Chrysler-powered Dragmaster of Ocean-side — 8.94 ET; Glenn Stokely, Redondo Beach, blown Chrysler — 9.26 ET, 164.7 m.p.h.; Bob Brissette, San Monica, blown Olds — 9.38 ET, 164.42 m.p.h.
