Torrance Firms Awarded Orders By Phone Maker

Western Electric Co., the Bell System's manufacturing and supply unit, bought supplies amounting to nearly \$130,000 from 12 business firms in Torrance during 1960, Pacific Telephone said in figures released today.

In total, the company paid out nearly \$167 million in California in 1960 for supplies and services, gross payrolls and major new construction.

This breaks down to about \$457,000 a day and represents eight per cent of the \$2 billion Western Electric spent last year in all of the 50 states and 15 foreign countries.

Close to \$140,237,000 was paid to 2566 suppliers in 209 California towns for raw materials, telephone company supplies and government sub-contracts.

Local Rabbi On TV Today

The Union of American Hebrew Congregations will present Rabbi Henri Front of Temple Menorah in Redondo Beach in a television program dedicated to Shabuoth, the coming Jewish holiday, at 10:30 a.m. today on KNXT.

Rabbi Solomon F. Kleinman, western regional director of the UAHC, said that Rabbi Front will appear on the "Light of Faith" program to discuss the historical significance of Shabuoth, which begins at sundown, May 20.

The holiday celebrates the giving of the Ten Commandments to Moses and its name, Shabuoth (which means Weeks) is derived from the story that the event took place seven weeks after the Jews began their exodus from Egypt to freedom.

Also celebrated during Shabuoth is the Spring emergence of the first fruits.

Rabbi Front will show the route of the exodus on a map of the Middle East area, and also feature a Torah Scroll opened to the Ten Commandments.

Appearing with him will be the temple's Cantor Harry Newman and its choir under the direction of organist Fay Newman.

Math Workshop For Teachers Set for Summer

Rabbi Front Joins Others For Service

Rabbi Henri Front of Temple Menorah in Redondo Beach, 112 N. Catalina, will be among spiritual leaders in synagogues and temples throughout the Southland who will use the Fifth Commandment — Honor Thy Father and Thy Mother — as the basis for sermons at Shabuoth services Sunday morning, May 21.

Shabuoth is the two-day Jewish holiday (beginning at sundown May 20) which traditionally marks the giving of the Ten Commandments to Moses.

Rabbis of all groups — Orthodox, Conservative and Reform are cooperating with the Los Angeles Jewish Home for the Aged at 325 S. Boyle Ave. in spotlighting the problems of senior citizens for their congregants during Shabuoth.

The joint venture was arranged by Rappi Israel Chodos of Sinai Temple in Beverly Hills, as chairman of the Home's rabbinical advisory board, and Sol Levine, the Home's past president who is now chairman of its religious committee.

Founded in 1912, the Home is now celebrating its "golden year" of service to the community's aged as the largest of its kind outside of New York City. Most of the participating rabbis had previously toured its five-acre grounds to meet the 310 residents and learn first-hand of the multiple services offered senior adults.
