Mrs. Dossi Shares Main Dishes, Cookie Recipes

Mrs. Gene Dossi, 4733 Greenmeadows, mother of four children with healthy appetites is today contributing three recipes for wholesome delicious foods that are favorites with her children and her husband.

Mrs. Dossi has made home-making her career and her most cherished hobbies are cooking and sewing. She also works at the Madrona School cafeteria and teaches piano to neighborhood children. Since sewing is a hobby, she makes all her youngsters' school clothes and at Christmas time there is an array of

toys and doll clothes.

Mr. Dossi is a Los Angeles policeman stationed in the Accident Investigation Division. He spends much of his spare time remaking old TV and hi-fi sets.

The Dossi children are Denise 11, Debbie 10, Dee-Ann 9, and Johnny 6. They are all students at the Newton Elementary School.

The Dossi family attends the WALTERIA Community Methodist Church where Mrs. Dossi teaches the third grade Sunday school class.

Her choice recipes being shared today are:

HALUSHKI (Czechoslovakian)

Grate 6 to 8 large potatoes in a large mixing bowl. Add 2 eggs and 1 tsp. salt. Mix. Add enough flour to make a dough about the consistency of a drop cookie. Drop by the teaspoonful into a large pot of boiling water, and let cook for about 7 minutes.

In the meantime, chop 1/2 pound of bacon very fine and brown in a large skillet. Add 1 small head of cabbage, chopped very fine, to the browned bacon and let cook until cabbage is golden brown.

When the potato dumplings are all cooked and drained, add them to the bacon-cabbage mixture and toss until dumplings are covered.

Mrs. Dossi suggests that hot string beans flavored with olive oil and a tossed green salad complete this favorite dinner.

SWEET AND SOUR SPARERIBS

Place about four to six pounds of spareribs, cut into serving pieces, in a large Dutch oven and place in an oven (400 degrees) for about one hour. Drain off all the accumulated fat.

Then cover with the following sauce:

| 2 slices bacon (cut in small pieces) | 1/2 cup brown sugar |
| 1 lge. can pineapple (crushed) | 1/4 cup vinegar |
| 1 green pepper (sliced) | 2 tbsp. soy sauce |
| | 2 tbsp. cornstarch |
| | 2 tbsp. water |
| | 1 large onion (sliced) |

Saute bacon, onions, green pepper in a heavy skillet. Add juice from pineapple. Cover tightly and simmer 20 minutes. Then add rest of pineapple, brown sugar and soy sauce. Mix cornstarch with water and add to mixture. Stir until sauce is clear and thick. Pour sauce over spareribs and continue baking for another 1 1/2 hours.

| 1/2 cup shortening | 1-oz. baking chocolate (grated fine) |
| 1 cup sugar | 1 egg |
| 1 cup flour | 1/2 tsp. black walnut flavoring |
| 1/8 tsp. salt | |

Cream shortening and sugar. Add egg and flavoring, mixing well. Add grated chocolate and mix. Stir in flour. Drop on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake at 375 degrees for 10 minutes. Makes about three dozen cookies.
