### Torrance Doctor Receives Funds for Kidney Research

A Torrance resident has been awarded a \$1450 research grant by the National Kidney Disease Foundation.

Dr. Fred G. Smith, Jr., 1219 Cranbrook, is the recipient of the grant by the foundation's Southern California chapter. Dr. Smith, who is a member of the teaching staff at Harbor General Hospital and also affiliated with the UCLA Department of Pediatrics, will use the funds to study renal functions of premature and full-term infants at Harbor General hospital.

He shared a total grant of \$11,250 with six Southland scientists who will seek the cause and cure of kidney diseases, according to Aaron Schwab, local chapter president. Kidney diseases today rank as the nation's fourth largest killer, claiming more than 30,000 lives annually with more than 3000 fatalities in California alone.
