Armco Offers Debentures Due in 1986

Public offering of \$50 million Armco Steel Corp. 25-year 4 1/2 per cent sinking fund debentures due 1986 was made May 22 by an underwriting group headed by Smith, Barney & Co. Inc. The debentures are priced at 99 1/4 per cent and accrued interest, to yield approximately 4.55 per cent.

Net proceeds from issuance of the debentures will be used to prepay \$50 million of notes payable to banks.

THE DEBENTURES are redeemable at the option of the company at prices ranging from 104 per cent through May 31, 1962 to 100 per cent after May 31, 1984, except that they may not be optionally redeemed prior to June 1, 1966 through funds borrowed at an interest cost of less than 4.55 per cent annually. The company is required to make annual sinking fund payments of \$2,500,000 during the years 1967-1985, inclusive—an
