

Radio Amateurs Looking Forward to Field Tests

Each year radio amateurs look forward to the forthcoming American Radio Relay League Field Day event. They all agree that this test of emergency-powered equipment squeezes more enjoyment into a single weekend than any other operating event. Clubs working under conditions which could well be encountered in an actual emergency, will set up and operate multi-transmitter stations, independently of normal power facilities.

The Marina Amateur Radio Club, according to Steve Leasko, WA8DUX, club activities chairman, will set up and operate five such stations in the Palos Verdes Hills on June 23, 24, and 25, as participants in the 1961 Field Day activities.

OPERATION will continue on an around-the-clock schedule, with operators working in shifts. Thousands of amateurs throughout the nation will be eagerly scanning the various radio bands for the MARS signal. Points will be earned according to the number of stations contacted, and club operators will be out to capture as many as possible.

Church Hosting Missionary To Philippines

Gregorio Tingson, often called the "Billy Graham of the Philippines," will speak at the 7 p.m. service Sunday at the Calvary Baptist Church, 2818 Manhattan Beach Blvd.

Tingson, a convert of American Baptist Foreign Mission work in the Philippine Islands, became pastor of the First Baptist Church at Iloilo, and then Evangelist for the Baptist Convention in the Philippine Islands. At present he heads the Oriental Gospel Association, Inc., which seek to help oriental nationals reach their own people for Christ.

Pastor H. Earl Kuester describes Tingson as "One of the most dynamic speakers I have ever heard." "He presents a straight-forward gospel message in flawless English, and with great spiritual power," the pastor added.

Tingson will be speaking at Los Angeles Youth for Christ Saturday night, and will be leaving June 7th for the Philippines.

Rev. Kuester will bring a Communion Meditation and officiate at the observance of the Lord's Supper at the 8:30 and 11 a.m. duplicate Sunday services. The Right Hand of Fellowship will be extended to new members at the close of the service.
