Garden Checklist

1. It isn't necessary to thin Peaches, but if you're willing to sacrifice quantity for better quality fruit, take a tip from commercial growers and thin Peaches to leave only one fruit every five or six inches along the branch.
2. Warm weather vegetables such as Tomato and Pepper can still be set out as transplants. Beans, Beets, Squash and many other vegetable seeds can be planted.
3. Stake Chrysanthemums, Carnations and Delphiniums. Be sure that Dahlias are kept tied to their stakes as they grow.
4. Feed lawns lightly once a month. Water them thoroughly at least once a week during summer months.
5. Lift Daffodils as the tops dry off or merely remove the tops and let them be for another year if the clumps aren't over-crowded.

Civic Symphony Festival Hailed as Great Success

The latest concert of the Civic Symphony season was given last Saturday night at Redondo Auditorium. The orchestra gave a brilliant performance. It was conducted by Maestro Elyse Aehle, whose authentic understanding of the "Classics" as well as her ability to give a rousing interpretation of modern music becomes more evident with each performance.

Joseph Haydn's "Drum Roll" symphony was very well prepared. This symphony, which introduced Haydn's greatest period of composition, was interpreted with classical perfection, except for a slight flurry at a stand among the violins when the man on the left apparently turned two pages at once, much to the consternation of himself and partner.

RECOGNIZING familiar melodies, the audience was intrigued by the Khatchaturian particularly the lyrical sweetness of the Lullaby and the dizzying speed of the "Sabre Dance" and the "Gallop."

Paul Moore, deputy to Supervisor Burton W. Chace, spoke of the need of the community for artistic development and how well the Civic Symphony is meeting this need.

Ballet La Jeunesse occupied the second half of the program. Their Aquarelle Enapagne by Natalia Clare was an example of fine choreography worthy to be included in the repertoire of the New York City Ballet.

HERE FIVE soloists were well-contrasted, showing both style and spirit. In Balletiques, not only was there the same fine choreography and skillful dancing but as well the brilliance of the male dancers was breath-taking. The young composer, Michael Lotweisen, deserves special praise for a very interesting score. It deserved orchestrating.

Most amazing was the Zapateado danced by Julio Torres. This was "Flamenco" at its best. This famous artist's flawless style in every move, in every pose, brought the enthusiasm of the audience to such a pitch that the applause "stopped the show."

FINE EXHIBIT of contemporary art was hung in the auditorium building halls. Its merit would lead one to believe that this area is one of the finest art centers in the West.

Let us see more of this excellent work.

This, the crowning program of this symphony season, brings to a close a series of six programs which included such world-famous conductors as Eakaty Ahn, such great music as the opera "Aida," many local soloists such as Louise Di Tullio, flutist, winner of first place in the L.A. Philharmonic, special concerts for Scouts and families, and a "Pop" concert in the park.

All programs were well-attended and some, such as this last one were given to enthusiastic capacity houses. This is an enviable record of the contributions of the Civic Symphony. — Vera Mills.
