East vs. West Cycle Battle Looms in Nationals at Ascot

A motorcycle speedway war between the East and West with Carroll Resweber of Cedarburg, Wis., spearheading the invaders and Neil Keen of Pasadena the home forces is taking shape for the eight-mile national championship race Saturday night, July 22, at Ascot Park, 183rd and Vermont.

Resweber, current king of the two-wheelers, has won the Grand National championship three years running — 1958-59-60 — the first rider to win three in a row.

He also leads for the 1961 AMA title with 23 points after national races at Daytona, Fla. (200 miles); Laconia, N.H., (100

miles); Pittsburgh, Pa., (15 miles); and Columbus, Ohio (10 miles).

KEEN, 27-year-old toast of the Ascot dirt half-mile track has never won a national race, but he's heavily backed by Southland fans to turn back Resweber over the eight-mile route.

He holds the all-time win streak record at Ascot and is the No. 1 rider in the United States on half-mile tracks.

Keen will be well supported by other Southland riders in the nationals including the famed BSA Wrecking Crew: Al Genter, Los Angeles, defending national eight-mile champion; Stu Morley, Los Angeles, Ascot record holder for the national distance of 8:00.20; and Jack O'Brien, Santa Monica.

QUALIFYING for the Ascot nationals for both expert and amateur riders will be held Friday night, July 21, along with a complete program for novice or first-year riders.

In the meantime, all the coast riders warmup for the nationals at Ascot this Friday night in J. C. Agajanian's weekly 16-event program climaxed by the triple-header

main event — expert, amateur and novice.

Racing July 14 starts at 8:30 o'clock, qualifying at 7.

Howard Stakes for two-year-old colts and geldings at five and a half furlongs on Thursday, several of the top candidates for the \$100,000 added Hollywood Juvenile Championship July 22 are scheduled to tangle.

Included in the lineup will be Maine Chance Farm's Gun Glory, who rattled off 1:03 1/5 in a six-length victory at the Howard distance in his last start; C. V. Whitney's Killoqua, runner up to Indian Blood in the recent Haggin Stakes; Rex C. Ellsworth's Wallet Lifter, third in the Haggin, and other flashy youngsters looking ahead to the rich Juvenile.

THE HOLLYWOOD Gold Cup at a mile and a quarter Saturday will present the all-star cast of the meeting.

Kerr Stable's Prince Blessed, winner of the American Handicap July 4th; Wonder V Farm's Sea Orbit, who took both the Inglewold and Golden State Breeders' Handicaps; Greenville Farm's First Balcony, already a winner of a Hollywood hundred-grander this year in the \$112,700 California; High Tide Stable's Whodunit, who won at the Gold Cup distance in the Corcoran Handicap; Connie M. Ring's Dress Up, runner-up in both the American and Inglewold Handicaps, and Elmendorf Farm Nickel Boy, second to Kelso in the \$100,000 Suburban Handicap at Aqueduct July 4th, are among the outstanding handicap stars certain to be in the Gold Cup lineup.

Yellowtail, Albacore Catches Up In San Diego Fishing Contest

For the first time this season, San Diego deep sea anglers today were in the enviable position of being able to make a choice of either yellowtail or albacore and being able to fill the order.

The long delayed run of yellowtail at the Coronado Islands suddenly slid into high gear the last two days and at the same time long range boats were working out for albacore on one, one and one-half, and two-day trips brought in good catches of longfins.

Indicating how hot the yellowtail action was, the boats of the H. & M., Point Loma, and Fisherman's Landing fleets racked up 605 yellows Saturday for the second best day of the season.

On the albacore front, the Paloris and Qualifier, on two-day trips, made heavy catches ranging up to 152 fish, but the Capt. Midnight, Sabre, and Betty Lou also scored inside them. In fact, the fish now appear to be moving in a little closer and this might influence boat schedules in the near future.

Among the larger albacore checked in were two weighing 24 pounds 15 ounces, one caught by Dick Roberts of San Diego and the other by Bill Thorpe, Rolling Hills.

George Fukumoto, Torrance, qualified with a 23-14 albacore.

In the first match, 20 shots slow-fire at 25 yards, Palmer took overall winner honors with 167x200, Robert Maass of 6258 Pageantry St., Long Beach won first class honors with 148 while Dick Manning of 679 Center St. in Costa Mesa won second class with 98.

Palmer, again, took overall honors in the second match consisting of 10 shots in a slow, timed and rapid-fire known as the Camp Perry Course with his 278x300. First class winner with 248-7x was Robert Akers of 279 Bowling Green Drive in Costa Mesa with second class going to Frank Steinmetz of 34332 Camino El Molino in Capistrano Beach for his 199.

Any calibre pistol or revolver is permitted in these beginners' matches which are open to civilians only, junior or senior, who are not classified by the National Rifle Association.

A Common Misnomer



The Dead Heat, once a rarity in racing and now, thanks to the photo-finish camera comparatively common, is a misnomer. Races were once decided by the winner of two out of three heats. When a tie occurred the heat was dead and had to be run off. Today the heat is only a term used for a race and it is far from dead when neither judge nor camera can separate horses at the finish; the purse is split and the payoff pools divided among the holders of winning tickets on each horse. Prior to the universal use of the photo camera 1908 recorded 11 most dead heats — 10. In 23 there were two and one of the horses involved was aptly named Deadlock. Today the camera records so many ties that the American Racing

Manual has ceased to list them. In 1951, the last year they were listed there were 730 of which 371 were for first place. Perhaps the most famous of dead heats was the three-way tie between Brownie, Wait a Bit and Bossuet in Aqueduct's Carter Handicap of 1944. The great horse Domino figured in two dead heats, both match races, one with Dobbin at two and as a 3-year-old with Henry of Navarre. One dead heat in which neither the purse nor the betting pool was divided was that involving Princess Thania and Beyond in the Acorn Stakes at Belmont Park in 1956. Both belonged to Calumet Farm and thus ran as an entry and those who bet on either one would have collected had the other won.
