investigate the matter more thoroughly.
Lynn supported the separation of the classes, saying: "This is what the people who voted for me want."
Cooke came back with the reply that "You represent the community, not just the people who voted for you."
Lynn retorted, "Until they vote me out of office, I'll represent the people who voted for me."

THE MAJORITY of the overflow crowd seemed to feel the separation of the classes was good.
In other action, the board tabled, for 60 days, a bid of \$65,000 for the Old Walteria site. The move came on a motion from Lynn, who believes the school site will continue to increase in value.
Over the years, the Board has received many offers to buy the school property. These offers have ranged from \$20,000 to \$40,000.
After careful questioning, the board determined that all summer students are being given, and will continue to be given, the option of receiving credit for the summer courses.

AT A SPECIAL meeting Tuesday night, the Board of Education unanimously passed

a school budget of \$12,168,616. It was also noted at the meeting that the district has \$875,000 in reserve.
Before another large crowd, the Citizens Committee gave a report questioning some areas of the budget. Dr. Hull then reported that pressure from the committee had forced the average cost of sending a child to school to be lowered from \$397 to \$388.
The budget passed by the board had been trimmed by the administration of approximately \$135,000 that had been included in the tentative budget.

JAMES ARMSTRONG, high school teacher and president of the Torrance Education Assn., issued a plea to the board for higher wages for teachers, stressing the fact that Torrance was losing many top teachers because the salaries offered locally could not compete with those available in other districts.

Armstrong asked specifically for raises in the top end of the pay scale and a lessening of the number of steps required to receive these top salaries.
Following a discussion on the possibility of trimming any more from the budget, Dr. Hull remarked that Torrance is the most economically operated district in the state, and it would not be feasible to attempt to increase this economy.

Zody's Will Open Long Beach Store

Zody's Discount Department Stores' newest location will open Aug. 10 in Long Beach, according to Richard H. Wolfe, vice president and general manager of the Southern California chair store operation. This is the third store to be opened by Zody's since June of 1960 and is part of a 36-store chain that is planned for California within the next several years.

Located on a seven and a half acre site, the new Zody's will feature an extravagant use of color with plastic laminates being used for departmental identification. Mike and Dale Clark, A.I.A., recent graphic design award winners, have been retained to develop the design and fabrication of the interior signs and decorative screens. Contractor was the Wm. P. Neil Co., Ltd.

IN ADDITION to the conventional major appliance, ready-to-wear, jewelry, photo, baby and sporting goods departments, the Long Beach store will include a new lay-away department adjacent to a huge stock room. "This feature has been specifically developed for

holiday shoppers who are assured that their merchandise will be properly stored and cared for during the lay-away period," Wolfe stated.

Wolfe also reported that the Long Beach store would have an enlarged shoe department providing greater selection and increased facilities for better customer service including adequate seating. Another innovation will be the construction of a massive illuminated pylon sign which will be used for identification in three directions as well as for sales messages.

THE STORE will have two

snack bars; a service facility in front with a large unit in the rear. A total of 12 check out stands will handle the self service customers. Like other units in the southland chain the floor is of terrazzo while the ceiling is of acoustical tile. Zody's in Long Beach will have a building area of 75,451 sq. ft. and enough parking in front for nearly 1000 cars. Other locations presently in operation are in Garden Grove and Redondo Beach. A fourth Zody's will open in Northridge in the San Fernando Valley within the next few months.
