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manimously a request from Home Savings and Loan for back rent due on quarters occupied by the Torrance Recreation Department in the association's building at 1511 Craze...

A NEW subdivision containing 23 lots was tentatively approved for R. A. Watt. Location of the tract is southwest of Garnet and Entradero in the Dominguez Water Corp. area where the city has no water service facilities. It was recommended that Dominguez serve the new tract.

An ordinance amending Sec. 421 of the City Code relating to the trapping and impounding of animals was approved after considerable attention was given a demonstration of traps approved by the Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

Mrs. Marylou Cushman appeared to reiterate her complaints of cruel methods used by a neighbor in capturing stray cats and insisted that all baiting of traps with fish be made illegal within the city.

"WE CERTAINLY favor every humane practice in Torrance," Mayor Isen commented, "and we feel we have gone as far as we can legally in protecting animals by following all of the suggestions of the SPCA. This council is always responsive to appeals of this nature but we think we have been doing pretty well when we have had only two complaints on alleged cruelty during the past year. For a city of 106,000 people, we feel this is doing very well."

In other actions the city approved the use of a building on Smith Brothers property on Pacific Coast Hwy. for temporary use of the Chapel little theater group; approved recommendations of City Manager Wade Peebles for reclassification of city personnel and accepted for filing a communication from Douglas Horlander, formerly a public works assistant, requesting that charges made against him by Manager Peebles be filed with the Civil Service Commission.

COUNCIL BRIEFS

Councilman Nick Drale arrived a few minutes late sporting a new moustache which drew comment from Mayor Isen. Drale remarked he just wanted to "look my age."

PLEDGE to the Flag, a regular feature preceding every council meeting following invocation by Rev. Milton Sippel of the First Christian Church, was led by Fred H. Mill, of National Supply Co., and former president of the Chamber of Commerce.

Hills attended the meeting with other Chamber officials who entertained members of the council at dinner following the meeting. Harold G. Frenz, chamber president, gave a short talk in which he praised the city officials for their efforts at keeping down expenses.

"Our new program in the Torrance Chamber," Frenz said, "has a goal of eventually making the Chamber of Commerce completely self supporting. We want it to serve the street just as it serves the businessman and the industrialist. We all want it to serve the city and make Torrance a better and more prosperous city."
