Annuals Brighten Up California Patio During Early Fall Months

The garden that can't use more color by the end of July is a rare one, and its owner has either a green thumb or a good gardener. Fortunately for the rest of us, the lack of color is nothing serious, with the number of annuals to be found this month in any California Assn. of Nurserymen show yard.

You'll find Zinnias, Petunias, Marigolds, Scarlet Sage and Cockscomb in C.A.N. nurseries, not to mention Dwarf Dahlias, Portulaca, Ageratum and Lobelia. Transfer them to your garden and they provide a shot in the arm to keep things going. Planted in and about the patio area — or even on the patio in planters — these can't help but brighten your late-summer outdoor living.

MANY OF THESE annuals will be showing color when you buy them, but for the sake of more bloom later, muster the courage to pinch out whatever bloom is on the plants. Nipping the top of a plant will force it to branch out and produce more buds. Besides, you only postpone bloom for a short time.

Choose your sunniest spot for Zinnias, Cockscomb, Scarlet Sage and Portulaca, a semi-shaded area for Ageratum and mostly sunny for the rest, though all will tolerate part shade.

IT SEEMS needless to remind anyone that annuals are not to be planted without first working the soil over and improving it with setter manure. Yet, C.A.N. members report that an appalling number of gardeners suffer half satisfactory results because they failed to dig. There is no substitute for turning the soil, and a mere trowel turned at planting time is not enough.

Open Primary Vital, Says GOP Leader

"An open primary for grassroots selection of candidates—not a slate dictated from the summit—is vital for Republican strength and unity in '62," Los Angeles County GOP Chairman Judd Leatham said this week, following a Republican County Chairmen's campaign conference in Los Angeles July 27.

Leatham, Campaign Chairman of the County Chairmen's Assn., declared: "As the elected leaders of the Republican Party in California, we believe

it is our duty to make sure that all candidates for statewide office have a fair chance to be heard by the voters, despite pressures exerted by any party faction, however influential."

To accomplish this, the Chairmen are planning a series of regional meetings through the fall and winter, at which all Republican candidates for state offices will be invited to discuss their programs and views with county committee members, heads of volunteer

clubs, precinct leaders, and other grassroots Republican workers. "In this crucial election, it is essential to have candidates who are genuinely the people's choice," Leatham finished.

The conference members also examined precinct materials for statewide use prepared by a joint Los Angeles-Orange County committee, and made plans for wider use of nationally known speakers invited to Los Angeles by Leatham.
