

Harbor College Offers Classes In Glass Work

Chemical Glass Manipulation, a new course in Chemical Technology, will be offered for the first time at Harbor College during the fall semester, according to an announcement today by George Rainey, chairman of the applied technology division.

The class will meet on Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 6:30 to 9:30 beginning Tuesday, Sept. 12.

GLASS MANIPULATION is a six-hour laboratory class emphasizing elementary techniques and practices of the manipulation and fabrication of simple laboratory apparatus from heat resistant glass. The operations of bending, cutting, grinding, pulling and joining glass are included in the course. Students will be required to fabricate basic laboratory glassware.

Pedro V. Aguirre, instructor for the class, has an extensive background in chemical glass repair and fabrication, having been employed for more than thirty years with the Union Oil Co. in charge of this technical area. Aguirre is a member of the American Glass Blowers' society.

REGISTRATION for the course is by appointment. Early application will be necessary in order to obtain a priority registration permit for registration on Aug. 22, 23, 24 from 6 to 8 p.m. Applications for admission and registration permits may be obtained at the admissions office of the college.

"This is an elementary but highly technical course," stated Rainey, "which has the objective of providing a knowledge of glass as a workable material, developing manipulative skill in fabricating chemical glass apparatus and teaching safety techniques of handling glassware. The class meets a long-existing need for glass handling techniques in the many petroleum and chemical laboratories of the harbor area."

Firm Completes Ordnance Plant

A new ordnance facility equipped to handle pyrotechnics, explosives and propellants has been completed at the Torrance Municipal Airport.

It was constructed by the Hi-Shear Corp. which for the past two years has been engaged in the development and design of specialized mechanical-ordnance separation systems and devices for aircraft, missiles and space vehicles.

The ordnance facility, separated but immediately adjacent to the Hi-Shear plant, is self-contained and designed to conform to all pertinent specifications and codes of safety, according to company officials. The structures are also controlled for humidity and temperature.

The firm has also completed construction of an ordnance products and systems capability facility.

Completion of the ordnance facility increases the Hi-Shear factory complex to 112,963 square feet of manufacturing laboratory and office space and presents a totally integrated facility equipped for all phases of mechanical and ordnance systems design.


Formation of Information, Inc., a tabulating service bureau providing accounting and statistical information, was announced here this week by its president, R. V. Anderson.

(Continued from page 1) will contain some "FR" listings and some "38" listings he reported.

THE NEW system is being inaugurated primarily for reasons of expansion, White said, point out that ANC will enable the industry to serve up to three million more persons in Southern California.

And there are other advantages to ANC as well, White advised. A recent test conducted by the telephone industry proved that numbers having all numerals are just as easy to remember over a short period of time as those with letter prefixes. There were, in fact, fewer dialing errors.

He said one reason for this could be the elimination of the chance to mistake the letter "O" for the number "0" (OPERATOR), or the letter "I" for the numeral "1."

DIRECT DISTANCE Dialing which local subscribers will be using in the future will require the dialing of a three-digit area code, then the prefix, and finally five more numbers. The interspersing of letters among numerals under the old name-prefix plan could prove confusing to some people.

And, a world-wide direct distance dialing network is now envisioned by the American communications industry, as a result of the switch to ANC, White reported. The Arabic numeral is used extensively throughout the world, he explained, while name prefixes and letter vary according to particular country.

CERTAIN central office names pose spelling problems for customers. A customer calling a YUKON number in Ontario might erroneously dial "U-K, or dial "H-T" for Laguna Beach's "HYatt."

"Errors of this kind tie up much-needed equipment and, more important, cause inconvenience to busy people in today's world, White said.

Because the conversion to ANC will be on a gradual basis, it will take two to three years to complete in this area, he said. "And by that time most of the rest of the country will be nearly caught up with the telephone progress made here," he concluded.
