

# During this Week

Aug. 13, 1905 — Ronald Amundsen, Norwegian explorer, accomplished one of the most important tasks undertaken in geographic exploration, when he took his ship Gjoa, through the North West Passage. He was the first to accomplish this.

Aug. 14, 1772 — Thomas Rowlandson, British caricaturist, who drew the forerunner of modern comics, left London to study art in Paris, when only 16. A relentless hater of Napoleon, Rowlandson's first work belittled the dictator.

Aug. 15, 1789 — The first Catholic bishop appointed to the U.S. was consecrated in the chapel of Lutworth Castle, Dorset, England. John Carroll became Baltimore archbishop, Apr. 8, 1808. He founded Georgetown University, Washington, D.C., in 1789.

Aug. 16, 1902 — The U.S. opened its first zoological laboratory for study of parasites afflicting men, in Washington, D.C. Discoveries were made that solved the hookworm problem.

Aug. 17, 1807 — Robert Fulton's steamboat, Clermont, established steam navigation by making a 32-hour trip up the Hudson River. He is definitely known to be the first to use a riverboat for passengers and freight.

Aug. 18, 1734 — The first native American to graduate from a foreign medical college received his degree from Leyden University, Leyden, Netherlands. Dr. William Bull, Charleston, S.C., then became America's leading authority on colic resulting from lead poisoning, his thesis subject.

Aug. 19, 1942 — Capt. Don Gentile, known as World War II's one man air force, shot down his first Nazi planes during the Dieppe raid, a Junkers 88 and a Focke-Wulf 190.

Aug. 20, 1833 — Benjamin Harrison, future 23rd U. S. President, was born at North Bend, Ohio. Four hundred years after Columbus discovered America, Pres. Harrison proclaimed Columbus Day a national holiday, the first being in 1892. Now, about 35 states observe the holiday.

Aug. 21, 1791 — U.S. Attorney General Edmund Randolph gave the original opinion of that office, when he rendered a decision to Secretary of the Treasury Alexander Hamilton, making invalid government certificates.

Aug. 22, 1771 — The Massachusetts Soy, Boston, carried America's first advertisement of a dwarf being exhibited. The dwarf was 53 years old and 22 inches tall. He was shown at Widow Bignall's house, next to King's Head Tavern, just off Hancock's wharf, for a shilling admission.

Aug. 23, 1853 — Sixteen presidents, one vice-president and 21 cashiers, representing 38 banks, organized the New York Clearing House during a meeting at New York City's Merchants Bank. The plan was presented to all state banks on Aug. 31 and adopted Sept. 13.

Aug. 24, 1932 — Amelia Earhart Putnam took off from Los Angeles at 4:26 p.m., Eastern daylight saving time, in her red Lockheed, and arrived at Metropolitan Airport, N. J., at 11:32 a.m. the next day, thus completing the first transcontinental non-stop flight by a woman flier.

Aug. 25, 330 A.D. — Constantinople began a 40-day festival, celebrating its second finding and becoming a learning center. News schools, liberal laws, church councils and libraries were started.

Aug. 26, 1859 — An American shot a Canadian's pig for rooting up his potatoes on San Juan Island in Puget Sound. When taken to court, the boundary line was questioned and the issue wasn't settled between the U.S. and Canada for 13 years.
