Speculation Grows on What U.S. Consumer Will Do With Money

There is considerable speculation as to what the American consumer will do with his money next year, but it is generally conceded that he will spend more in 1962, despite the possibility of a tax increase to cover defense spending.

A leading magazine, Printer's Ink, makes this prediction and attributes it in part to "refurbished savings, aided by hold-backs on major expenditures this year, such as houses, autos and appliances."

One indication, the publication notes, is that, for the first time in months, people are withdrawing more funds than they deposit in savings associations. Expenditures for home improvement also seem to be improving, according to small loan companies.

Automobile dealers, too, are bullish, as are appliance dealers, who report that buying is firming up.

A decline in unemployment undoubtedly would help support this optimism. At any rate, the economy appears headed toward better times.

GAS ON THE MARCH — Despite the fact that the natural gas industry served 31,000,000 residential and 2,500,000 commercial customers in 1960, more than half of the 93 billion therms of gas it sent out last year went to 178,000 industrial customers. And the future of industrial gas usage, according to the Gas Appliance Manufacturers Assn., now seems brighter than ever.

The trade group explains that (1) improved materials are required to suit the needs of space technology, (2) there is a need for materials that will give consumer goods greater longevity and safer operation, and (3) modern gas processing equipment plays an increasingly important role in creating or processing such materials. Practically all consumer items, as well as raw materials, are "touched" by gas at some time during their production.

In fact, the trade group says, there now are more than 26,000 different industrial gas uses, and this total is likely to increase drastically by 1970 when the utilities expect to be serving over 250,000 industrial customers.

Some of the specific results of expanded gas usage foreseen by GAMA include elimination of blast furnaces in steel production, adoption of an "interruptible" five-day-week instead of the continuous seven-day-week in steel and other industries, and elimination of week-end work and "premium" wages.

MARKETING TREND — The remarkable strides made by department stores in tire sales during the past three years has prompted B.F. Goodrich Tire Co. to initiate a new concept in tire, battery and accessory marketing.

In cooperation with leading

department stores in major areas of the country, BFG this year is opening eight "Car Care Centers" — unique units considered by many industry observers as the start of a trend that eventually will bring other major tire manufacturers into the department store sales picture.

Department store tire sales have risen from almost nothing three years ago to more than 2,000,000 tires annually today, due largely to the suburban exodus and resulting suburban shopping centers featuring modern department stores and huge parking areas.

Five of the new Car Care Centers — which boast unusual attractions such as air-conditioned waiting rooms where customers can read or relax while their cars are being serviced — have already been opened in Minneapolis; St. Paul, Minn.; Sarasota and St. Petersburg, Fla.; and Wilmington, Del. Three more will open by year's end, one in Jamaica, L.I., N.Y., and two in the St. Louis area.







MORTGAGE OUTLOOK — Anyone considering a mortgage to apply for it before the end of the year since many lenders foresee an increase in interest rates on conventional mortgages. A Manhattan lender foresees rates increasing from 5% to 6 per cent by the end of the year; a West Coast broker also thinks rates might increase because of the surging economy. More cautious views come from a Chicago savings firm official who expects to firm up but foresees no increase this year. A Georgia lender expresses a similar view.

BITS O' BUSINESS — Cranberry growers, who have 350,000 hundred-pound barrels left from last year's bumper crop of 1.3 million barrels, apparently are thankful for a crop which has been crippled by frost.
