

Applications Available Now for Navy's College Training Program

Applications are now available for the Navy's annual competitive examination for its nationwide regular ROTC college training program, according to a recent announcement by the Dept. of the Navy. The mental examination is scheduled for Dec. 9 and is open to all high school seniors and graduates who can qualify.

Eligible young men may earn a commission in the regular Navy or Marine Corps through the regular NROTC. Upon receipt of a baccalaureate degree and completion of naval science training, NROTC students are appointed as career officers in the Navy or Marine Corps.

OUR MODERN Navy presents the young officer with many interesting and challenging duty assignments on, in and over the sea. Possible billets include duty in submarines or naval aviation, duty aboard ships in the technical fields of nuclear, electronics or engineering, or duty with the Staff Corps of the Navy. The Marine Corps presents other varied facets of naval life.

Male citizens of the United States who are sincerely interested in careers in the naval service and who have reached the 17th anniversary of birth and have not passed the 21st anniversary by July 1, 1962, are eligible to apply for this program. Those contemplating a college course which takes five years to complete must not have reached the 20th anniversary of birth by July 1, 1962.

PERSONS attaining a qualifying score will be given the Navy's rigid midshipman physical examination next February. Young men selected for the program will enroll in one of the 52 colleges of their choice where a Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps is located.

The regular NROTC is maintained for one purpose — to train and educate young men for ultimate commissioning as career officers in the Navy and Marine Corps.

FOR THOSE selected, all tuition, fees, and books, plus an annual retainer pay of \$600 will be furnished by the Navy for a period of not more than four years. The fifth year of a five-year course must be at the midshipman's own expense. In addition to the normal college curriculum, midshipmen in the regular NROTC will study a planned course in naval science subjects and spend part of three summers on training cruises with various Fleet units.

The deadline date for receipt of applications is Nov. 17, 1961. Applications are available from the nearest U. S. Navy Recruiting Station or from the counseling offices at Torrance, North, and South High Schools. These offices have been provided with specific information concerning the NROTC program and will furnish informational bulletins to any interested student.

Edison to Hike Payments for Scholarships

Increased awards for tuition costs and expenses will be offered winners of the Southern California Edison Co. College Scholarship Program this year, G. L. Blanchard, Edison's district manager, said today.

High school seniors winning the six scholarships offered in this third year of the Edison program will receive \$1000 annually toward tuition and expenses, Blanchard said. In addition, the private college or university each elects to attend will receive a direct grant of \$750 annually from the electric power company.

BROCHURES describing the Edison College Scholarship Program have been distributed to high schools throughout the 10-county area served by the company in Central and Southern California. Students wanting to compete for the Edison Scholarships may learn full details by obtaining these brochures at their high schools, Blanchard pointed out.

"This Edison program is designed to both help promising students reach their educational goals and, at the same time, ease some of the financial pressures besetting private colleges," Blanchard said.

High school seniors in Edison's service territory are eligible to compete. In addition to the six scholarships, the program offers \$50 savings bond awards to second and third place winners.

CMA to Open Two Centers Next Month

Senate Committee to Hear Testimony on Area Fishing

Senator Clair Engle (D-Calif.) yesterday announced that the problem of vanishing Pacific fisheries will be taken up by a Senate Commerce Subcommittee at field hearings Oct. 4 at San Rafael.

Senator Engle has been named chairman of the hearing by Senator Warren Magnuson (D-Wash.), chairman of the Senate Commerce Committee, and Congressman George P. Miller of Alameda and Congressman Clem Miller of Corte Madera have been invited to participate.

"We want to look at the question of why our Pacific fisheries are declining and what can be done about it, specifically in terms of getting scientific data and putting it to work," Senator Engle said.

"WE ALSO want to learn how those working in the field think the States and Federal Government can best share this responsibility," he added.


The Oct. 4 hearing will be at the Marin Rod and Gun Club at San Rafael. Governors and State Fish and Game authorities from Pacific Coast States, commercial and sport fishing representatives, biologists and oceanographers and Federal witnesses are being invited to testify.

SENATOR ENGLE said witnesses will be asked to address themselves to the following questions:

- How to meet the need to increase knowledge through basic fishery and oceanographic research.
- How data so obtained can be applied for rehabilitation and development of our fishery resources.
- How State and Federal agencies can best work together to accomplish this purpose.

THE HEARING will be one of a series to be held this fall in the Pacific Northwest by both the Senate Merchant Marine and Fisheries Subcommittee and the Fisheries Subcommittee of the House Merchant Marine Committee.

Senator Magnuson has announced Senate Subcommittee hearings in Washington and Alaska, as well as California. Congressman George P. Miller, chairman of the House Subcommittee, will join the Senate hearing at San Rafael and hold additional hearings of his own Committee.
