FRANCIS M. TUTTLE

Funeral services for Francis Mellen Tuttle, 1947 Reynosa Drive, will be held at 2 p.m. Tuesday at the A. M. Gamby Mortuary Chapel in Lomita. The Rev. Eldon Durham of the Lomita Presbyterian Church will officiate.

Mr. Tuttle, a guard at Doak Aircraft Co. here for several years before his retirement, died suddenly at his home Wednesday. He was born in Freeport, Maine, on Oct. 28, 1894, and had resided in Torrance for nearly 18 years.

A DECORATED veteran of World War I, Mr. Tuttle was active in many veterans organizations. He was the holder of the Distinguished Service Cross

and the French Croix de Guerre for his achievements in France during the war. He served from May, 1917, until August, 1919, much of it overseas.

He was a charter member of the Torrance Barracks, Veterans of World War I; a member of the Disabled American Veterans, and the Legion of Valor. He also belonged to the American Legion, Yankee Division Veterans Assn., and the Redmen.

Mr. Tuttle is survived by his widow, Ethel, and a son, Howard, who is enroute home from his Army post in Germany for Tuesday's services.

Burial will be in Green Hills Memorial Park.

LHC Educator At Meeting for Mental Health

Dr. Louise Snyder Johnson of the Dept. of Psychology at Harbor College traveled to San Diego this week to participate in the fourth annual meeting of the California Assn. for Mental Health.

A member of the board of directors of the state association, the local educator is also president of the Long Beach Mental Health Assn. At the convention she will participate in meetings on the theme "Action for Mental Health." Delegates will also visit the San Diego Center, California's first mental health day treatment center.

Dr. Johnson this week was also appointed to a committee to formulate a statement of policy for the Los Angeles City Schools in the area of mental health. Purpose of the committee will be to formulate a statement defining mental health and mental health procedures in the Los Angeles City Schools, to list present activities fostering mental health, and to consider possible needs for further activity in this field.

A member of the Harbor College faculty since 1957, Dr. Johnson holds a bachelor's degree from the University of

Arizona, a master's degree from Stanford and a Ph.D. from New York University. She is also a certified psychologist and served previously as a director of the Board of Mental Health in Philadelphia.
