Marymount To Double Enrollment

While most colleges are faced with the problem of turning away two out of five qualified applicants, Marymount College in Palos Verdes has announced that it will double its enrollment in September of next year.

This was made possible with the approval of a \$1,000,000 government loan for the construction of a three-floor all-glass dormitory on the campus located on the cliffs overlooking the ocean in this picturesque area.

The new facility will permit Marymount to admit 250 additional students on the campus of the well-known women's college, first opened in 1923 on the West Coast as a sister school to Marymount College in Tarrytown, N.Y.

Among well-known faculty members at Marymount College are Dr. Roger Wagner, head of the world famed Roger Wagner Chorale and frequent conduc-

tor at the Hollywood Bowl, composer Ernest Kanitz, artist Donald Totten, author Leona Surmellian and Dr. Mong Ping Lee, Chinese consul general in Los Angeles.

Marymount is the first educational facility in the United States which provided a year of study abroad for its students, usually during the junior year, at its colleges in Paris, Rome, London and Barcelona.

Art Contest Open at HC
