Advances Made In Navigation Set

A major breakthrough in performance and reliability of continuous-wave Doppler navigation equipment has been achieved by the Ryan IV, the new "second generation" navigation set developed by Ryan Electronics, O. S. Olds, vice president, Ryan Aeronautical Co., announced.

The Ryan IV, now undergoing flight tests, has demonstrated accuracies of better than 1/4 of 1 per cent in ground velocity, and better than 3/4 of 1 per cent in distance traveled.

In addition, Olds notes that the set reflects major advances in weight and size reduction, simplification of installation, versatility of application, and system integration.

The Ryan IV is being readied for production for the U.S. military services and NATO countries.
