500 in Final Tribute to Coach Verry

More than 500 mourners, including the great, the near-great, and the sideline fan paid tribute Monday to Coach Norm Verry, former All-American grizzer at the University of Southern California, and coach at El Camino College until his death.

Officiating in the memorial services at the Crenshaw Christian Church was its pastor, Dr. Joseph M. Applegate.

"Few men merit or achieve the roaring approbation of 100,000 critical spectators,"

Dr. Applegate read from a tribute written to the coach. "But Norm Verry knew how it felt to receive this acclaim," he said.

COACH VERRY died following a series of cerebral hemorrhages, the first of which occurred in flight to Boise, Idaho, Sept. 23 with his football team. He was taken off the plane at Reno, Nev., and later transferred to a Los Angeles hospital where subsequent attacks

claimed him despite surgical attempts to correct the condition. Following the memorial service, private interment was in Green Hills Memorial Park.

HE IS survived by his widow, Lois; their sons, Steven and Richard; a brother, Jack, of St. Louis; two sisters, Mrs. Barbara Whitendale of Visalia and Mrs. Anne Hahme of Manhattan Beach; and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Earle Verry of Fortuna.

Firestone Issues Challenge to USC Alumni; To Match Donations

Leonard K. Firestone has challenged University of Southern California alumni to increase their annual giving to USC's academic Master Plan.

The chairman of the USC board of trustees established a \$250,000 "challenge gift" with which he will match this year's

contributions to the Alumni Fund. The gift was announced by Dr. Norman Topping, USC president.

Gifts of \$50 or more will be matched three for one by Firestone. For gifts of between \$25 and \$49, he will give two dollars for every one. Gifts of \$5 through \$24 will be matched dollar for dollar.

His "challenge gift" was the first of its kind to USC, and one of the largest of this type to any university in the nation.

FIRESTONE'S \$250,000 fund was created only two weeks after he announced an unrestricted commitment of \$500,000 to the Master Plan from the Firestone Foundation.

Aims of the Master Plan are to encourage able and eager students, instructed by wise and dedicated professors, planning imaginative and stimulating courses of study, plus the facilities to make all this possible.

Seeking more full-time students and more graduate students, USC plans to increase its enrollment only 25 per cent in the next 10 years compared with an anticipated national increase of up to 100 per cent. Concurrently, USC plans to increase its faculty up to 50 per cent.

ENDOWMENT of professorial chairs in specialized fields of teaching, higher salaries for USC's present distinguished faculty, and the attraction of other great scholars to the teaching and research staff are other goals of the Master Plan. A trustee since 1957 and chairman of the board the past year, Firestone is a graduate of Princeton University.

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
