Large Crowd Sees Saxons Sink SHS

Just as in 1865, the 1961 version of the Civil War ended in favor of the North as the Saxon gridders rolled to a 19-to-7 victory over intra-city arch-rival South High Friday night before a standing room only crowd of 5,000 at the Torrance High stadium.

After battling to a 0-to-0 deadlock in the first period, North lit the score-board up with just 26 seconds left in the first half.

Doug Ball carried the pigskin over from four yards out, limaxing a six-play, 40-yard drive. The drive began when Skip Mooney intercepted a Dan Ly pass and returned it to the Spartan 40-yard stripe.

INGLEWOOD held only a thin 7 to 6 lead going into the final period, but a score by quarterback Troy Winslow iced the game for the Sents.



Robbie Frey of Torrance continues her march toward the Southern California Women's Match Game Championship by retaining first place at the three-quarters mark.


Averaging better than 195 for the 24 games of the semifinals, she holds a 4.12 Peterson Point lead over second place Janet Harman.

SEAHAWKS ROUTED

Long Beach Pigskinners Steamroll Harbor Eleven

Unable to cut the mustard against Metropolitan Conference foes, Harbor College lost its second straight and third loop decision of the year Friday night as mighty Long Beach City College rolled to a 42 to 6 victory.

Things looked bright for Harbor before the loop official-

ly opened, as the Seahawks began the practice schedule by upsetting highly touted San Bernardino, 30 to 25.

Harbor came right back the next week and cruised by Citrus, 22 to 0, and HJC patrons had visions of their most successful squad in history. But the dream was shattered as Santa Monica, the first Metro foe for the Hawks, squeaked out a 19 to 13 win.

HJC WAS NOT through yet though, and the Blue and Gold roared back the next week to erase East Los Angeles' bid for an upset, 15 to 13.

Then the real fun began as Bakersfield moved one of its most powerful grid teams ever into the Seahawk Stadium and came away with a 42 to 0 decision.

LONG BEACH was next on the list, but the 'Hawks fared only slightly better against last year's Junior Rose Bowl champs than against the Renegades . . . they scored.

For awhile in the first quarter, it appeared Harbor might make a ball game of it, holding the Vikings to an 8 to 6 lead, but LBCC ran up 16 points in the second period and 18 more in the third quarter to make a rout of the contest.

ROBERT MOSS, a 212-pound halfback from Narbonne High, raced seven yards for the lone 'Hawk tally of the night. From then on it was all Long Beach.

Dee Andrews, the leading scorer in the Metropolitan Conference, flew to a pair of touchdowns to lead the Vikings.

Andrews scored on a 56-yard run and a five-yard jaunt.

QUARTERBACK Chris Dawson struck through the air for two additional Long Beach scores. Dawson pitched five yards to Dick Van Wert and 69 yards to Dave Garrison.

Jerry Orcutt also tallied twice for the winners, going one yard and three yards for six points. Orcutt added four points to his scoring total for the night, running over two extra-point attempts. Andrews ran over one PAT to finish with 14 points for the evening.

Harbor's homecoming will be this Friday against Los Angeles Valley.

JIM SLEKER scored all of El Segundo's points, scoring two touchdowns and kicking a conversion.

Culver City warmed up for the tilt by coasting to a 34 to 19 win over Lennox. The Centaurs are unbeaten for the season, having walked over Mira Costa, 27 to 6; Hamilton, 19 to 6; Aviation, 27 to 7; El Segundo, 38 to 12; and Palos Verdes, 27 to 6.
