

Chapel Theatre to Open Drama

Monday marked the opening of the recently completed general offices of the Akron Co., at 5120 Melrose Ave., in Los Angeles.

The building is a modern single-story structure of brick, steel, and glass. It will be the nerve center of a retail business which spans six continents and, in its construction, major emphasis has been placed upon insuring smoothness and coordination.
