## Medic-Alert Foundation Endorsed by Diana Club

The Medic-Alert Foundation International, a charitable, non-profit organization established to help protect millions of people with hidden medical problems, today received the official endorsement of the Redondo Beach Dianas. The Junior Membership, California Federation of Women's Clubs, has proclaimed Nov. 5-11 as Medic-Alert Week.

In announcing the endorsement, President Mrs. Paul Taylor said everyone should become familiar with the Medic-Alert "life-saving" emblem insignia and they should encourage friends and relatives with medical problems to investigate the protection these stainless steel, or silver, bracelets and necklaces offer.

Well known in the United States, the easily recognizable Medic-Alert bracelets have engraved on the back a warning to physicians and passers-by of the accident or seizure victim's problem. Diabetics, hemophiliacs, epileptics, persons allergic to drugs or who have rare blood types or other problems all come under heading of "hidden medical problems."

The Medic-Alert Foundation International maintains a central file on its members' medical problems at the Foundation's Turlock, Calif., headquarters. The vital information in these files is obtainable at a moment's notice on a 24-hour, collect call basis by physicians and other authorized personnel in an emergency.

Mrs. Taylor said that it is estimated one member in every family has a hidden

medical problem and that over three million people in the United States are in need of some identification that will give information for proper medical treatment in an emergency.

The Medic-Alert Foundation International is endorsed by numerous state Medical Associations, the National Sheriff's Assn., the International Assn. of Fire Chiefs and countless others.

Mrs. Taylor advised that people wishing further information should write to Medic-Alert Foundation International, Turlock, Calif.
