

Saxons Defeat Redondo, Qualify For CIF Playoffs

Knowing if it won it would qualify for the CIF playoffs as the Bay League is number two team. North High scored in every quarter to walk past Redondo, a team which had vowed to beat them, 33 to 19 Friday night in the Seahawk's Bowl.

Finishing only one half game behind Inglewood, loop champion, the Saxons will meet El Rancho Friday night in the opening game of the CIF playoffs.

Never in trouble, but never in a comfortable position, North carried a 13 to 6 lead into the locker-room and added to the lead afterwards in the bruising, hard-hitting battle.

DOUG BALL took advantage of the Saxon bread-and-butter play, going off tackle in the first period to tally the initial score of the evening. The conversion was missed, but at the end of the first quarter, the Saxons maintained a 6-0 margin.

Redondo played Santa Claus for the next North touchdown as the Seahawks fumbled on their own 10-yard line and Bob Mirabella recovered for the eventual winners. Quarterback Jeff Bell went over on a QB sneak for the TD. Rich Parker's kick was good for the conversion.

BEHIND the running of Wayne Willis and Jon Fowler, the Seahawks bounced back as Willis scored following a long Redondo drive. Mike Jacobs came up from his half-back spot to stop Fowler just short of the goal when the 'Hawk back tried to run the conversion over. At the half it was 13 to 6.

After intermission, the host team came roaring back as Willis and Fowler ate up the yardage on their bruising jaunts into the Saxon line. Fowler finally scored, but the Seahawks were still behind, 13 to 12 when an attempted pass fell incomplete.

ON THE ENSUING kick-off, Dan Claxton moved the North juggernaut back into a more comfortable lead as he lugged the pigskin 65 yards for the six-points. Parker's PAT was good and North moved into a 20-12 lead.

Redondo just could not get going after that as fumbles and penalties halted every semblance of a drive which was begun.

JOE CASTORENA then turned in the icing score of the contest for the Saxons as he went 55 yards on a quickie for a score. Parker's kick was again successful and NHS led 27 to 12.

Paced by Fowler's running, the Seahawks were not yet ready to roll over and play dead as they narrowed the margin to 27-19 following a 7-yard TD run by Fowler and a keep play good for the conversion by quarterback Bob Johnson.

WITH ONLY 14 seconds left to play, Ball put his second score of the night on the scoreboard, going off tackle for the touchdown.

North will be up against a formidable foe on Friday against El Rancho. The San Gabriel Valley champs are

ranked sixth in the CIF and boast an 8-0-1 mark. Only one squad has scored more than one touchdown against them all year.

THE SAXONS came up with another potent offensive weapon against Redondo in the leg of Norm Dow. Only a junior, Dow kept the 'Hawks in the hole much of the time with his booming punts. One occasion, kicking from deep in his end zone, he uncorked a 60-yard boot which pulled North out of a troubled situation.

It was a rugged loss for the Seahawks to absorb. Last year, with Redondo in first place in the Bay League, North went in and knocked them off 20 to 8. The defeat battered them into the third-place slot in the tight loop race, and as the season wound up, the Saxons finished ahead of TUHS.

IN 1957, North won its first football game ever, ending an 18 game losing streak with a 6-0 win over Redondo.

The following year, NHS won again, 13 to 0. In 1959, Redondo took the Saxons to camp, coming away with a 13-0 decision.

I see where the old Bible of Baseball, the St. Louis Sporting News, has solved the problem of Orlando Cepeda's identity. As you may recall, Giant manager Al Dark has never been sure whether the fella from Puerto Rico swims or flies, whether he is a first baseman or an out-fielder. The paper named Orlando to its National League All-Star team; and, with the heavy authority which characterizes its pronouncements, placed him on first base.

That Orlando is a first baseman is a secret to only three people in the world: Squire Horace Stoneham, manager Dark, and Willie McCovey, who guards the initial sack (that's a stylish sporting term for first) while Orlando is ordered to prowling the unfriendly precincts of far left.

This schizoid handling of Orlando by his superiors did not prevent him from being the outstanding Giant on the club last season, not excluding Willie Mays. He led the National League in home runs (46) and in runs batted in (142) and batted .311. Against the morbid pitching of the American League, Orlando would be right up there with Mantle and Maris, the Swatters Supreme. He is, in addition, the first Giant in history to lead the league in both home runs and RBIs.

All of this poses something of a problem for the Giant hierarchy. Orlando is in Puerto Rico now consulting with his fiscal advisers (the entire male population of the island) about how huge a bite he should put on Squire Stoneham when spring labor-management talks open up.

This year Orlando got maybe 27 grand, and Willie Mays got maybe 85 grand. If Mays was worth 85 large ones, it's my view that Orlando was worth more, one performance. And his performance, extraordinary as it was, would have been better if manager Dark had not opened the season with the flat statement that McCovey owned first, period, and Orlando was to estivate in the long grass. As it turned out, Orlando played first about half the season.

It can even be argued that Orlando is a bigger gate draw than the great Mays. Willie was on the verge of becoming downright unpopular with the fans until he up and smacked four home runs in a single game last season. Willie's getting a little long in the tooth. He is not, and never has been, wholly happy in the West; and there are those who say these things show in his play. He's still great, but there seems to be less of those extravagantly expert catches, a diminished willingness to make like Willie Sutton on the bases.

I would not care to be the Squire when that little envelope comes up from Orlando's lawyer in San Juan. It will probably ask for no less than \$100,000. But Mr. Stoneham isn't called the Squire for naught. Orlando is an indentured servant, as all ballplayers are; and the Squire's price will be the right price, or else. My guess is it will all end, after galling words, around 42 long ones.

DESPITE only a single loss in the Pioneer League, 12 to 7 to Culver City, Torrance finished in second place behind the Centaurs. The win cinched the number two spot for the Tartars.

Five Torrance gridders crossed the Palos Verdes goal for six-pointers. Robinson, Cambon, Bob Clark and Mike Cichini and Jerry McLean all chipped in to the Tartar cause.

PIONEER LEAGUE titlist Culver City will meet Temple City, Rio Hondo League champ, next week in the first round of the CIF playoffs.

The victory over Palos Verdes gave Torrance a 6-2-1 mark for the season. The Tartars raced to wins over Lawndale, Beverly Hills, Aviation, Lennox and El Segundo and Palos Verdes. The Tartars dropped tilts to Bay League champion Inglewood and Culver City. THS tied Redondo in its first game of the year.

For the Sea Kings, the loss gave them a 1-7 slate. Palos Verdes fell before Ocean-side, El Segundo, Lawndale, Culver City, Beverly Hills, Lennox and Torrance, beating only Aviation last week.

El Camino Sets Wrestling Meet, Pitting Alumni Against Varsity

Displaying an exceptional record of only two losses in five years, one of the best wrestlers in the South Bay area, Redondo's Frank Addleman, is set for the best wrestling dual meet in the state on Friday night, Dec. 1, at 7:30 in the El Camino College Women's Gym.

Before a crowd of 1,001 fans, the Alumni squeezed by the Varsity 19-18 in the initial meeting of the wrestling giants last fall. Every match was so exciting that five of the matches were decided by a single point and one match ended in a tie. The El Camino Varsity wrestlers only other loss was to San Bernardino, California state J. C. champs last season.

Addleman, the Alum's 150-pounder, won the California state JC Championship while competing for El Camino in 1956 and was second in 1959. At Long Beach State College, he was unbeaten in dual meet competition for two years and was named the outstanding wrestler at Long Beach in 1960-61 after capturing third place in 1961 and fourth in 1960 in the Pacific Coast Inter-Collegiate Amateur Assn. Finals at Oregon in 1961.

IN FREESTYLE wrestling, Addleman captured the Southern Pacific AAU Championship in 1961 at 136½ pounds and nabbed fourth in the Olympic Regional 1960 Trials.

WHILE COMPETING at Redondo Beach Union High School, Addleman captured the Bay League Championship in 1954 and 1955. He finished second in the CIF Finals in 1955. Wrestling experts describe Addleman as exceptionally fast; he is a grappler who enjoys pushing his opponent until the opponent is exhausted. He is virtually impossible to take down and is always in top physical condition.

Camino Ends Year, Stuns ELA Eleven

Closing out a carbon copy of last season, El Camino's gridders romped past host East Los Angeles, 33 to 6 Friday to wind up in fourth place in the Metropolitan Conference.

Exactly the same as last year when the Warriors dropped their first game, and fell before football might Bakersfield, Long Beach and Santa Monica while whipping everyone else on their schedule, the Tribe collected a 5-4 record.

Stymied by 145 yards worth of penalties, the Indians allowed the Huskies the first score early in the opening period, but from then on out it was all El Camino.

FOLLOWING a Huskie score when Jerry Cahill went six yards for the touchdown, Camino took over control of the game and never looked back.

Jin Torok, playing one of his finest games of the year at quarterback, scored the first ECC score on a one-yard sneak

after moving the Tribe downfield on his passes. Torok completed four aeriels in five attempts for 53 yards to spark the march.

TOROK pitched 15-yards to Kurt Altenberg to put ECC ahead to stay. Before halftime, the Warriors had stretched the lead to 26-0 when Tom Blanch intercepted a screen pass and stepped 10 yards into the ELA end zone.

After intermission, bruising fullback Bill Kelley capped a 47-yard march in which he had gained 38 yards by bulging over from the one-yard stripe.

CHUCK PETERSON, all league halfback from Gardena tallied the final El Camino six-pointer by slicing over from six yards away.

From then on, the contest turned into an exhibition of reserves as both teams shot substitutes in to play out the rest of the contest.

Determined Olymps Give South Battle

It looked like Christmas for awhile Friday night as South High thumped Leuzinger, 21 to 7, both clubs playing give-the-ball away during the first half of the final Bay League game of the year for both squads.

At the half it was 0-0 as a fumbled-filled first half prevented both teams from pushing the pigskin across.

After the rest period, it was all South as Harvel Seigel rambled for two touchdowns and booted a pair of conversions to wind up the evening with 14 points.

THE FIRST break in the scoreless tilt came when Seigel dove six yards for the initial TD. Still in the third quarter, Bob Woodrum iced the contest for Sparta when he boomed 40 yards on a counter play.

Minutes later Seigel set the crowd on its feet when he pulled in an Olympian punt and maneuvered 80 yards to put

over the final South score of the night.

EARL SHEPHERD was responsible for the conversion.

Leuzinger's lone score came late in the final period when the Olymps recovered a fumble on South's 40-yard line and proceeded to push into the end zone.

The victory maintained the Spartan's position in sixth place in the Bay League.

SOUTH OPENED the season with a win over Jordan, then dropped five straight, bowing to Inglewood, Hawthorne, Redondo, North and Morningside before snapping the five game losing streak with a victory over Mira Costa.

For Leuzinger, it improved 1,000 per cent over last year.

The Olymps came within a hair of knocking off their first opponent, falling before Lawndale, 13 to 12. The game marked the first time in two years Leuzinger had scored a touchdown.

EC Cross Country Squad Runs in So. Cal JC Meet

El Camino College cross country runners travel to Pierce Junior College to compete in the All-Southern Conference Junior College cross country meet Tuesday at 3 p.m.

Top contenders will be El Camino, 1961 Metropolitan Conference Champions and Dual Meet Champions; Santa Ana, Mount San Antonio College Meet Champions, and Cerritos, San Diego and Bakersfield, always big threats to any championship - bound team.

Last year Cerritos College took first place, followed by Fullerton and Orange Coast. El Camino sagged to an unexpected fourth place after having won the Metropolitan championship and dual meet championship.

El Camino distancemen once more completed the Metropolitan Conference competition in top style with an impressive 8-9 record this season. In matching the won-loss record of last year, the Warriors have run up a string of seventeen consecutive dual meet victories since 1959.

THE DEFENDING Metropolitan Champions did it again this year by breezing over the Centinela Park course scoring only 23 points. The second team, San Diego, scored 69 points. Third was East Los Angeles with 89 points, followed by Bakersfield with 101 points. Los Angeles Valley with 110 points, Long Beach City College with 137 points and Santa

Monica with 149 points. This was the third Metropolitan Meet championship for El Camino under Coach Ray Southstone.

Richard Fernandez blazed over the 3.2 mile course in 15:34, breaking by forty seconds his own previous course record set earlier this season at 16:15. Following his were two more thundering Warriors Mike Thornton (15:45) and Ron Butterfield (15:55).

JOE RAZO of East Los Angeles (16:00) and Dan Cloes of San Diego (16:08) took fourth and fifth place medals. Gene Blankenship showed the fighting spirit which prevailed throughout the race by each Warrior distance man as he barely nudged out Elmer Harlan of Los Angeles Valley at the finish line in 16:15, taking the sixth and last medal awarded. The time was one second off the old record. Harlan had to settle for seventh place with 16:15.2, followed by Ron Steele of San Diego in 16:19, Al Lujan of Bakersfield in 16:20, Ray Vandenberg of Santa Monica in 16:21 and Ron Bolton of El Camino in 16:23, the eleventh man to cross the finish line and the fifth man to cross for ECC.

The El Camino team received two trophies, one for the Metropolitan Dual Meet Championship and the other for the Metro Conference Meet Championship. Its members took four of the medals awarded to the first six places.

Knights Battle St. Bernards To 6-6 Tie

Bouncing back to score with only six minutes remaining in the contest, Bishop Montgomery's John Clark barreled over the Knight's only touchdown of the game, but the conversion failed and Montgomery was forced to settle for a 6-6 tie with St. Bernard's Friday.
