CAR-TRUCK CRASH KILLS SAILOR

Palos Verdes Teacher in Death Plunge

A 21-year-old sailor was killed Friday morning when his car collided with a tank truck on Figueroa Street near 223rd Street.

Police said Ralph King, crewman of the USS Phoenix, apparently fell asleep at the wheel of his convertible and veered head-on into the tank truck-trailer which was driven by Edwin Hayes, 44, of Lynwood.

King was thrown from his car and under the truck where his right leg was severed from his body, police said. The truck driver escaped serious injury.

The peninsula area also re-

corded a traffic fatality Thursday afternoon when Mrs. Belle Fishel, 50, of Portuguese Bend, a third grade teacher at Montemalaga School in Palos Verdes Estates, died after her car went out of control on Via Zurita in Palos Verdes Estates. Her car plunged down a bluff and landed on Espinosa Circle.

Setback

Hearing Scheduled

A proposed building setback line on the north side of 218th Street between Western Avenue and Harvard Boulevard will be the subject of a Los Angeles City Planning Commission hearing to be held at 1 p.m. on Monday, Dec. 11, at the Wilmington Branch City Hall, 411 Neptune Ave.

Property owner Dante Marrocco has requested that a 15-foot front setback be established in connection with the proposed development of apartments on 450 feet of frontage. This block was recently rezoned to the R3 multiple-dwelling classification permitting apartment development.

Without the proposed building line a greater setback would be required because of the existing setback of other buildings in the block.

The hearing will be conducted by an examiner designated by the City Planning Commission. Following the hearing a report will be submitted to the Commission and, if favorably recommended, final action will be up to the City Council.

Dogs Bites Boy Going to School

County Health Department authorities are trying to locate a brown and white dog which bit Kim Couwger, 6, of 23910 Huber Ave., Wednesday on 238th Street between Walnut Street and Eshelman Avenue.

Regional Planning Commission approval has been given for construction of 44 single family residences on seven acres of land north of 220th Street, east of Avalon Boulevard in the Carson area. Owner and subdivider is Dan E. Butcher of 2371 Torrance Blvd.

Republicans Lead Only in 46th District

Democrats continued to hold a comfortable lead over Republicans in all Torrance areas except the 46th Assembly District, figures released Friday by Benjamin S. Hite, registrar of voters, reveal.

Of the 43,912 voters registered within the city of Torrance, 26,126 are Democrats and 16,167 are Republicans, Hite said. The balance are registered for minor parties or decline to state a preference.

Democrats continue to hold more than a 2-to-1 lead over Republicans in the 17th Congressional District, with 98,076 persons preferring the Democrats and 38,405 registering as Republicans. Total registration is 141,039. Congressman Cecil R. King, a Democrat, represents the 17th District in Congress. A similar advantage is held by Democrats in the 68th Assembly District, represented in Sacramento by Democrat Vincent Thomas. Democrats in the 68th total 48,241 while Republicans total 16,892.

In Assemblyman Clayton Dills' 67th Assembly District, the Democrats outnumber the Republicans 49,835 to 21,513. Total registration in the district is 74,115.

The meeting is scheduled for 6:30. In addition, Don Drysdale of the Dodgers will talk on his life as a baseball player.





Carson Area Road Work Funds Alloted

County supervisors have allocated \$8,200 for a roadway improvement project on 214th Street east of Vermont Avenue in the Carson area.

The work will be scheduled by the Los Angeles County Road Department pending the completion of other portions of the current work load.

Work will consist of reconstructing the existing pavement and extending it to join existing curb and gutter. In addition, a catch basin and other appurtenant drainage facilities will be constructed and the pavement of the intersection will be reconstructed.

"This improvement project typifies a phase of work performed by the County Road Department in cooperation with property owners who constructed the curb and gutter under county permit," Supervisor Burton W. Chace stated. Benefits to be derived upon completion of the project are improved area drainage, reduced roadway maintenance costs, and increased roadway operational efficiency.

County to Buy Lomita Land

Land at the corner of Narbonne Avenue and 242nd Street in Lomita will be purchased by the county for the County Administrative Center. Purchase of the land will create a contiguous parcel of land owned by the county for its Administrative Center which is now under construction.
