Of Swedish descent, Mrs. Henry Kirst, today's guest cook in the HERALD'S recipe column, inherited her love for cooking from her mother and her grandmother, whom she says, "thought every girl 9 and 10 years of age should be able to bake bread, cook a meal, and clean a house."

In this case of "love and marriage" there's a happy balance, since Mr. Kirst, of German descent, inherited a taste for good food.

The Kirsts, who live at 22643 Draile Dr., have lived in Torrance for nine years. Mr. Kirst is a pilot with TWA and flies a Boeing 707 Super Jet from Los Angeles to New York.

There are three Kirst children, Jeffrey, 12, who attends St. Lawrence School; Bradley, 8, and Louise, 5, both students at Seaside Elementary. The Kirsts, as a family, love the water. They have two sail boats, a 16 foot "Snipe" and an 8 foot Naples Sabot. The latter was built by Mr. Kirst. They belong to the King Harbor Yacht Club and the Long Beach YMCA.

Mrs. Kirst is a member of the TWA Wives Club and is a

With her love for cooking, entertaining is a hobby with Mrs. Kirst, who has chosen four of her favorite recipes to share with readers today.

Betty's Banana Bread
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup butter
2 eggs
2 cups flour
1/2 cup nuts
1 teaspoon soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
3 or 4 bananas
(very ripe)
Cream sugar, butter, two eggs. Sift together 2 cups flour, soda, salt, nutmeg. Add sifted ingredients to butter mixture. Mix in bananas, which have been beaten slightly. Add nut meats, walnuts, pecans or filberts.
Pour mixture in large loaf pan or two small loaf pans. Bake 3/4 to 1 hour in oven at 350 degrees.

Party Chafing Dish
1/4 cup butter
3 Tablespoon flour
1 cup milk
1 small can mushrooms (sliced buttons & juice)
1 tablespoon celery (finely chopped)
1/4 teaspoon paprika
1 cup small shrimp (cooked)
1/2 teaspoon salt
dash of pepper
1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
1 can cream mushroom soup
1 tablespoon pimiento
4 cup grated cheese
5 or 6 hard boiled eggs (slice or wedge)
1/4 cup white wine (optional)
Make a white sauce of butter, flour, milk, salt, and pepper in top of double boiler. When thickened add Worcestershire sauce, mushroom soup, mushrooms, celery, pimiento. About 15 minutes before serving add remaining ingredients. Bring to serving temperature, stirring carefully. Pour into warmed chafing dish. Serve over thin toast, fluffy rice or chow mein noodles. Serves 8.

Holiday Salad
1 box cherry Jello
1 cup hot water
1/2 cup pineapple juice (chilled)
1 cup crushed pineapple
1/2 lb. fresh cranberries
1/4 orange (unpeeled)
1/2 cup walnuts (chopped slightly)
1/4 cup chopped apple
1/4 cup chopped celery
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup sugar
Add water to Jello. When dissolved, add chilled pineapple juice. Set aside to jell slightly. Grind cranberries and orange. Mix with nuts, apple, celery, pineapple, sugar and salt. Stir until sugar and salt are dissolved. Combine with Jello, which should be jelled enough to keep fruit from floating. Pour into mold and chill until firm. Serve with 1 cup mayonnaise into which the juice of two oranges has been added. Garnish with greens.

Applesauce Tarte
2 cups thick apple sauce
1 1/2 cups ground almonds
1/2 tablespoons sugar (powdered)
3 eggs
1 pint whipped cream
2 tablespoons sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
Pour apple sauce into a buttered baking dish. Mix almonds and sugar. Separate eggs. Beat the egg yolks in one at a time. Whip the egg whites until stiff and combine with the yolk mixture. Pour combined mixture over the apple sauce and bake in oven for about 1 1/2 hour at 400 degrees. Serve luke warm with lots of whipped cream, with optional sugar and vanilla.
