

Sending gifts through the mail this Christmas? Here are some suggestions for making sure your package arrives safely at its destination.

First of all, be sure to protect the items you are sending by wrapping them in heavy corrugated cardboard or in a strong cardboard box. Pack the contents of the package tightly; the post office can refuse

to accept any package if its contents shift around.

When mailing Christmas cards, be sure to use the correct postage. A Christmas card deserves first class postage, in a sealed envelope with a four-cent stamp. Be sure to put your return address on the envelope, in case the person concerned has moved, or in case you have addressed the card

incorrectly.

Protect any fancy wrappings, bow and frills with corrugated cardboard or a swath of tissue paper.

USE STRONG, plain wrapping paper that is new, tying large or heavy packages with enough twine to encircle the package both ways at least twice. Be sure to use strong

twine.

Packages going to foreign countries must be sealed. Domestic mail packages may be sealed, provided they carry the label, "May be opened for postal inspection."

Use two printed mailing labels — one on each side of the package. Print the name and complete address of the person your package is going to, plus your own name

USC Professor Examines The World of Communism

"There are two tests Communism can never pass: the test of truth and the test of comparison."

With these words, the University of Southern California's Dr. Roger Swearingen introduces high school students and teachers to his pioneer textbook — "The World of Communism" — which will be published this month (Houghton Mifflin, Boston).

Already endorsed by some of America's foremost educators, "The World of Communism" answers the 100 questions most often asked by American high school students about Communism, Russia, and China.

frank, easy-to-understand language. They are based on the personal background of the author who ranks as one of America's leading experts on the subject of Communism and they also reflect the best thinking of many other prominent authorities on Soviet-Asian affairs.

Author Swearingen wears

three hats at USC: Basically, is an associate professor international relations and history. He is director of the Soviet Asian Studies Center and is also director of the newly created Research Institute on Communist Strategy and Propaganda at USC.

EXPLAINING the reason for writing "The World of Communism," Dr. Swearingen has said:

"When the stakes are the survival of our way of life, we would do well to find out something about the rules of the game. It would also be helpful to know as much as possible about the number, strength, and weakness of the players on the opposing team.

FINALLY, WE had better learn all we can about the system, formations and specific plays employed by the coach on the other side — lest we be taken by surprise, overwhelmed and defeated.

Describing the book as a "breakthrough," Dr. Robert E. Jenkins, Pasadena superintendent of schools, says: "We are developing plans to use this textbook in our 12th grade government classes beginning in the spring. In this way, all students leaving Pasadena high schools will have increased appreciation and understanding with regard to the dangers of Communism as they assume their new roles and new responsibilities as citizens."

From Dr. C. C. Trillingham, Los Angeles county superintendent of schools and chairman of the steering committee for the countywide project on Our American Heritage came this statement:

"THE SOUND scholarship of Dr. Swearingen and the first-hand contacts he has had in recent years with life in Europe and Asia, inside and outside the Iron Curtain, qualify him well for the preparation of this guide for American youth."

Pioneer text that it is, the Swearingen book may be widely used throughout America because:

The California State Department of Education recently recommended that courses in Communism be started in all California high schools by September of 1962.

A number of districts within the Los Angeles county system and some of the city schools already are offering units of study on the subject and more such offerings are planned.

In Florida, a course on Communism is mandatory for all high schools in the state.

The Louisiana state legislature recently voted \$30,000 just for the operation of seminars at the high school level on the threat of Communism.

HERE ARE some of the questions answered in "The World of Communism":

Why bother studying Communism? . . . What is Communism? . . . How serious is teen-age delinquency in the USSR? . . . Can you explain Marxism in a few words? . . . What is a Communist Front organization and how can it be identified? . . . What are the goals and purposes of World Communism? . . . Why don't people in Communist countries rebel? . . . Do the Russians pay income tax? . . . How does the Russian "man on the street" feel about America? . . . What do Chinese think of Russians? . . . How did Communism get started in America?

Son of a California family, author Swearingen received his Ph.D. degree from Harvard where he worked with the Russian Research Center. During World War II he served on General MacArthur's staff and has acted as a special consultant for both the State and the Justice departments. Under a Ford Foundation grant he has traveled to Japan, Korea, Hong Kong, and Southeast Asia, Russia, and Europe. As a visiting professor of government at Columbia University, Dr. Swearingen worked in the Russian and East Asian Institutes there.

Dr. Swearingen is the author of "Red Flag in Japan," "International Communism in Action — 1919-1951," and the recently published book of Soviet cartoon humor entitled "What's So Funny, Comrad?"
