YMCA Fund Drive Seeks Private Aid

More and more people are becoming aware of the fact that they can benefit their favorite charity, and still have a tax savings, according to Hanley Rogers, chairman of the Torrance YMCA endowment committee.

"For example," Rogers said, "a person who has securities that have appreciated in value can give them to the 'Y' without having any capital gains levied."

Stocks that cost relatively little when purchased but having a much higher value now, can be taken as a charitable deduction at present high value rather than the original cost.

Through another program, a person can make a gift to the "Y" and get a lifetime tax-free income.

Rogers, Torrance investment counselor, also pointed out that it would be very easy to make the "Y" the beneficiary under a low cost insurance program. The cost of this insurance with the "Y" as beneficiary would be tax deductible. There is still time this year to set up such a program, he added.


